The train wreck occurred to miles mutte of London on Sunday when an express train jumped the tracks and plunged

down an embankment bgt. Neil McNabb was born in Acton and spent all his life here. He enlistied with the Larne Scots in April 1941 and within a month or so of callsting went oversens. He was promoted overseas to the rank of Staff-Sergeant with No 1 general re-inforcement unit of the Canadian Administrative wing. He went to Acton schools and before enlisting was employed with

the Storey Glove Co. Neil McNabb was one of Actor's fine young men. He was a keen student of astrology and later archaeollogy. He continued his studies over-Seas at every opportunity and became assecuted with professors in this work in England and Scotland and was made an honorary member of one of these societies.
