# News Spotlight

The Big Five Council of foreign ministers meeting in London has barked its diplomatic shins on a number of controversial topics and apparently made little appreciable progress on any one of the major questions on the agenda paper.

Russia, the United States and Britain by some accounts were broken up into an Anglo-American team and an opposing Soviet side on the thornier questions which faced the conference. So frequent were the disagreements of the Council and so small was their progress, that informed observers hinted at several junctures that a new meeting of Prime Minister Attlee, Generalissimo Stalin and President Truman would be necessary before any of the issues at point would be solved.

### Mediterranean Nag

The foreign ministers ran into trouble in the Mediterranean, where the Soviet Union asked an individual mandate for one of Italy's seized North African colonies. In discussing the Balkans, the western democracies and Russia again parted conference company because Russia has recognized Balkan regimes which Britain and the United States do not consider representative of the people. In the opinion of London and Washington the present Balkan regimes are puppet governments established by Moscow and run by a Communist minority in each country.

The problem of how the defeated German people should be treated came into prominence with a clash between Generals Eisenhower and Patton and stirred up comment around the world.

### Commanders Firm

The current crack-down by both Gen. Eisenhower and Gen. MacArthur is clear indication that these commanders are fully aware of the dangers of fraternizing. Both are clean-cut house in their respective territories with a stern energy that can only bring good results.

Two points are receiving special emphasis in both Germany and Japan. All militarists and Nazis and other sections of the population which are refusing to co-operate fully with the forces of occupation, are being eliminated from public office, even unimportant places.

Britain and the United States are planning on a large scale feeding program in Germany this winter and they may have to do the same for Japan. As one commentator put it, that's the sort of fraternity the Japs and Germans can understand, hungry people think with their stomachs.

### Meat Strikes End

Centre of agitation against meat rationing in Canada, Montreal spent a hectic week of strikes, rioting and arrests which ended with 78 under charges and the strikes ended. Butchers who had gone out on strike agreed to a plan of the Food Distributors' Association to abandon the strike in order to forward a less militant method of seeking changes in meat rationing regulations.

# Drunk Driving and Bad Conduct Police Court Cases

In Police Court in Milton yesterday afternoon, Donald Carey, 17, of Alliston, pleaded guilty to a charge of armed robbery and was sentenced by Magistrate K. M. Langdon to 13 months definite and one year indefinite in the Ontario Reformatory with 6 lashes on entry, 6 lashes at the end of 6 months and 6 at the end of a year. July 27th Alfred Homer, Burlington, gave the accused a ride and at the Clover Leaf on the Queen Elizabeth Highway, stopped and told him that this was as far as he was going. Carey pulled a knife and ordered him out of the car, Carey drove the car to Port Credit where it was recovered.

Gordon Titus and George DeForest of Milton were each fined \$25 and costs or 15 days when convicted on a charge of disturbing the peace with riotous and disorderly conduct.

Frank Brownhill of Hamilton, convicted on a drunk driving charge was sentenced to 15 days in Milton Jail and prohibited to drive a car for one year. He was ordered to stop the car by Constable A. R. Smith of Burlington and on doing so he told the constable he didn't own the car and had no license. He had been driving the car in a manner dangerous to other traffic.

Wilby Henhawk of Hamilton was convicted of drunk driving and was sentenced to 15 days, car was impounded for 3 months and he is prohibited from driving for 1 year. When Henhawk was first stopped Constable Smith phoned for Sgt. Dunham and while waiting Henhawk took the wheel and drove off, nearly colliding with a car at the intersection and driving very carelessly. Henhawk was charged with having liquor in the car, he pleaded guilty and was fined \$61.50 or 30 days to run consecutively with previous sentence.

# Urges Advance in Obstetrics

British Woman M. P. Says Modern Days Call for Modern Ways

LEEDS, England (CP)—Half an hour was spent by the National Conference of Labor Women here discussing what Dr. Edith Summerskill, Parliamentary Secretary, Ministry of Food, called the most important commodity in the world babies.

In that time, she said, 30 babies had been born in this country—one every minute. Probably 29 were born without any relief to the mother, in the same primitive way as their great-grandmothers gave birth to children. "It is no good," said Dr. Summerskill, "for older women to tell the younger generation: 'We had 13 children without an anaesthetic, why can't you?'"

"You cannot relate the life of the modern woman to that of her grandmother. She will not accept 19th century conditions in this century."

Dr. Summerskill urged that midwives should be trained in the use of analgesia, a modern method of painless motherhood. She was also in favor of giving the housewife "some measure of economic independence."

Among the improvements she wanted for mothers were good houses full and free education services and labor-saving devices in the home such as electric washing machines.

# HUGE UNION JACK FLOWN IN BELFAST

LONDON, (CP) Huge flags of the United Nations have flown in London streets during celebrations of victory, but a flag-making firm has set forth that really big flags seldom are seen.

The world's biggest flag was a Union Jack for Belfast, measuring 75 by 37 feet. The next largest was another Union Jack 45 by 22 feet, also made for Northern Ireland. The third is a White Ensign, 42 by 21 feet, made to be flown from the tower of Limestone Church here which has the right to fly this flag.
