Hornby Farmer Killed by Bull at Farm Monday

Farmer, Sustained Fatal Injuries

The Hornby community was indeed shockeds to learn of the death on Monday, of Mr. Clifford O. Robinson, While cleaning out the pen in which the bull at the farm was kept, Mr Robinson was attacked by the animal and sustained such acrious injuries that he died two hours later, while being taken to the Milton Hospital. He was in his forty-fourth year.

Mr. Robinson was born and raised on the farm in Esquesing Township where he met his death. He leaves his mother, three brothers and two misters and in their tragic bereavement, they have the sympathy of
