93 Entries In Halton Jersey Show At Milton Fair

W. Davies, Gerald Graham and Maurice Beatty Win Championships

Halton Jersey Breeders defied the unfavorable weather conditions and staged a record show at Milton on Sept. 29. Prof. A. D. Runions of Guelph, placed the awards. In all 76 head from 14 different Halton herds were on display. As usual the quality of the entries was exceptionally high.

Senior and Grand Championship bull was the first prize aged bull, Brampton Light Valiant, owned by W. Davies & Son of Palermo. Davies also had the reserve junior champion sire in his first prize junior bull calf, Manarvon Observer's Cavalier, fifth prize senior heifer calf and fourth prize junior heifer calf.

Halton Brook Farms, Oakville, had reserve senior champion bull in Brampton Wonderful Siffa; first prize senior bull calf in Halton Brook Linda's Baron; fourth prize junior bull calf, fourth prize mature milking cow, second prize three year old in milk; third prize two year old in milk, first prize dry 2 year old in milk, Halton Brook Linda's Luck, second and fourth prize senior yearling, fourth, sixth and thirteenth prize senior calves, first prize junior calf; first in the Open Get of Brampton Wonderful Stan; third and fifth in the junior get; first on Progeny of Laveridge Royal Lady, second and fourth on junior herd; and second in senior herd. The same exhibitor won the Grafton & Co. Special on his winning progeny, and the T. Eaton Co. Special for the Champion Get.

Maurice C. Beatty of Milton repeated his triumphs of former years by having the Senior and Grand Champion female and his four year old milking cow Lindale Estella Gladys, the same breeder had the reserve senior and reserve grand on his winning two year old in milk, Lindale Draconis Sunray Lass; first prize dry cow; second prize two year old heifer; junior champion female on his winning senior yearling, Lindale Draconis Estella Flash; first prize junior yearling; second, eighth and eleventh prize senior calves, third prize junior calf, second on the Get of Brampton Draconis Royal; fourth on the junior get of Brampton Basil War; first prize junior herd and first prize senior herd, and thereby won the Robert Simpson Co. Special.

Another popular win was that of Gerald Graham of Georgetown, on Brampton Pinn B. Am, later declared junior champion bull. Graham also had second in both the milking and dry cow classes, fourth prize three-year-old in milk; second prize two-year-old in milk; fifth prize junior calf and third prize senior herd.

Featherstone Bros. of Oakville as usual were strong contenders throughout winning the reserve junior female championship on their winning senior heifer calf, Avonle King's Lady 3rd, third prize senior bull calf, third prize junior bull calf, fifth prize mature cow in milk; fourth prize dry cow; fourth prize two year old in milk; third prize senior yearling heifer; second and sixth prize junior heifer calves; first prize on the Junior Get of Silver Spring April King, and second prize on progeny of dam.

Another first prize winner was John Ruddle of Georgetown, on Cluny Castle Successor Rose Second, in the three year olds in milk. Other prize winners were F. D. Charles, Georgetown on yearling bull, second; W. J. Alexander of Georgetown, second in junior yearling heifer, second in senior bull calf, and third prize cow in milk; Robert Ford of Milton, third and seventh on senior heifer calves; Tom Alderson of Hornby on junior heifer calf; and W. H. Devlin of Milton on two and three year old heifers in milk. In the Jersey Calf Club, Sam Harrop of Milton, had the winning calf.

NOT VERY IMPORTANT In this climate fuel bills are important, not the cost for any month. But a man was encountered the other day who had kept track of his monthly gas bills and had calculated the average for each month. It all comes under the head of what's interesting but not vital. The first fact is that, in Ontario at least, July is the only month which can be depended on not to go below 65 degrees outdoors and therefore not require some artificial heat indoors. August will take 3 per cent of the annual bill, September 29 per cent, October 67, November 123, December 156, January 184, February 173, March 142, April 82, May, 37 and June 4 per cent.

SCHOOL FOR FORGERS REVEALED IN BRITAIN PLYMOUTH, England (CP) — "Schools" where budding forgers can learn how to defraud the post office savings bank exist in the United Kingdom, said W. E. J. Major, prosecuting for the postmaster-general in a case against a sailor charged with obtaining \$50 by forging a post office bank book.

Mr. Major said that when one person had perfected the secret of forging to secure money from the bank, the system—which he did not reveal—was taught to friends at private classes. The sailor was fined \$45.

THE CLIFFS OF DOVER ONCE OCEAN OOZE

At one time in the geologic past the famous White Cliffs of Dover were merely an ocean ooze which was made up, for the most part, of microscopic animals with intricate, limy shells. Examples of these shells, now fossilized, may be seen among the collections of the Royal Ontario Museum.

With a change in level of the ocean floor, over fifty million years ago, these oozes were raised above the sea. The masses of tiny shells then became cemented together to make the celebrated chalk formation, seen on either side of the English Channel.

As in so many instances, the lowly organisms of other ages have greatly contributed towards building the foundations of our modern world. In this particular case they have helped to form the very bulwarks of our nation.

AUSTRALIA SHORT OF FARM WORKERS

CANBERRA, Australia, (CP) Australia's rural industries are short of 120,000 men. It is estimated by H. C. Wilson, former director of manpower for New South Wales.

When war began three industries employed 500,000 men. Of these 70,000 went into the army and 80,000 into secondary industries.

As 30,000 have gone back to the land making a total of 390,000 men, the shortage, compared with the 1939 figure, is 120,000. However, mechanization, speeded up by manpower shortage, may mean that fewer men will be needed in the industry in future.

How many servicemen will go on the land is uncertain. There is official talk in New South Wales of settling 100,000 at the rate of 1,000 a year. The state government has under inspection 236 large estates totaling 2,255,000 acres.
