A troop entertainer during the last two wars, Alexander (Sandy) Tait Macdonald, 58, of Rushbrooke Avenue, Toronto, died Saturday at St. Michael's hospital. Performing as a Scottish comedian, he had staged 200 shows in various parts of Canada during this war.

Born in Glasgow, Scotland, he came to Canada 35 years ago. He was for some years advertising manager of the "Farmer's Sun." He was an honorary member of the 48th Highlanders club, a member of the Enniskillen Lodge, L.O.L., the Queen Street Presbyterian church, and St. Peter's Anglican Church Men's club.

Surviving are his widow, Isobel (Storey) Macdonald, three daughters, Jessie, Myra, and Isobel, two sons, Jack with the R.C.A.F. overseas, and Andrew, discharged after service with the R.C.A.F.

ISAAC WEADGE

Death came suddenly after a few months illness to Isaac Weadge at his home on Willow Street on Friday, September 28th. He was in his seventy-second year.

Mr. Weadge was born in Erin Township the son of the late Mr. and Mrs. John Weadge and has lived in this vicinity all his life. He was first married to Miss Mary Chapman of Milton who died in 1912. Reeve Murray is calling a meeting to be held in the Council Chamber Monday evening, October 15th at 7:30 when each ward in the Township will be represented.

By law to assess the several school sections and Union school sections of the township for 1945 was read and passed.

Another by law passed provided for the installation of street lights in Norval.

Payment of the premium on the Township road liability insurance amounting to \$270.00 was authorized and the payment of \$300 to Bauman Bros. of the October road account. Road accounts presented by the Superintendent of \$3612.17 were passed. The custom work charged to Mr. J. Strandish in September is to be paid by the Township as it directly affects the Township road.

The Reeve was authorized to issue a warrant for a tax sale.

3000 IN HALTON SEE FILMS OF THE NATIONAL FILM BOARD

With the first month of Film Showings sponsored by Halton Federation of Agriculture, in co-operation with the National Film Board, completed, the Fieldman reports that some three thousand people attended the meetings.

In the Fieldman's opinion, the films shown to the school children left in their minds information otherwise unobtainable except by travelling, which is possible for only a small percentage of our people. The interest and enthusiasm shown by all of the children demonstrated a renewed interest in school life. In every group the children were very keen and eager to respond to questions on the film, asked immediately after each showing. The correct answers proved they had followed the pictures closely. A large number of schools have been carrying on projects.

In summing up the suggestions of the teachers on future films, health, agriculture, and social studies predominated.

It is quite obvious from the discussions held at each existing meeting of the adults, and also from personal contact, that Halton Farmers agree that a soundly planned policy of reforestation is desired. Our people seemed shocked at the enormous waste both in tree and man of Canada's vast timber wealth.

The film "North West" by Acton showing the development of the North West Territory by the state, created very interesting discussion as to who should continue the development of our Northern oil, mineral and timber wealth, the State, private individuals or corporations. The majority favored the state. Most of those undecided favored the state if they had assurance of a carefully planned policy of economy.

"Home to the Land," a film outlining the veteran's land act, proved to be of outstanding interest to Halton farmers. The unanimous opinion of all groups being that 6,000 dollars was inadequate to settle a soldier on a 100 acre or larger farm, also that after an environment of efficiency and mechanism for three four or five years, the soldier should be equipped for farm life in a manner and his farm stocked with the type of stock recommended to other farmers by the Department of Agriculture in order that he will be interested and happy.

Our people also feel that all the nation's resources exerted to win the war should be utilized to hold the peace. Provision for emergency of cash capital seems to have been overlooked also the soldier empty out and above the 6,000 dollars, whether his own or loaned to him by a relative or friend, should be protected.
