#### Saskatchewan Farmer Hits Novel Plan to House 1700 (hickens

MIDALE (CP) -- When a chicken rancher A. Lee, wanted a henhouse for his 1,700 white leghorns he didn't let the lumber shortage or the scarcity of carpenters bother him. He built the coop of mud.

The coop, 175 feet long, 20 feet wide with 16-inch thick walls' was constructed of dirt which was scraped up around the yard. The building has windows and is covered with a shingle roof. Drew in 1943 set up a 'secret political police organization for the purpose of collecting by secret apying, material to be used in an attempt to keep him in power."

The report said that the work of the special or anti-sabotage branch of the provincial police, was continued by Constable William Osborne-Dempater after the Drew government took office in 1943, although it was not brought to the attention of Attorney-General Leslie Blackwell.

Osborne-Dempster's action in giving secret material to outsiders was termed "highly improper and inexcusable" but "not a jot of evidence" was found to indicate the premier or cabinet knew of his activities

The report said that if Mr. Jolliffe in his statements meant to charge that Messty Drew, Gladstone Murray, Toronto public relations counsel, M. A Sanderson of Toronto, Osborne-Dempster and George C McCullough publisher of the Toronto Globe and [ Mail, entered into a consultacy," the charge utterly fails for lack of proof."
