At the same time the number of unplaced workers in Canada had risen to 133,000 an increase of 9,000 and one that was partially att-

ributed to a speed-up in demobilization from the forces. The demand for building trades, men and general construction workers continued high throughout the Dominion, but a shortage of important materials was creating a serious bot-


