Local Industry Shows Progress In 1945 Business

Statement of Wool Combing Corporation Shows Company Continues to Improve Position

The following item from The Financial Post of last week will be read with interest by our readers since it concerns one of our industries which has been in operation only a few years and gives employment to over 200 of our residents.

During the first nine months of 1945 the volume of business of Wool Combing Corporation of Canada increased 6.26% over the same period of 1944 while operating costs were reduced 5.52%, according to audited figures. The Financial Post is informed. As a result the net profit before provision for taxes on income was \$183,560 for the nine months ended Sept. 30, 1945, as compared with \$113,004 for the similar 1944 period. Part of this improvement was due to a reduction in the amount of depreciation charge, however, The Post understands.

Earnings per share in 1944 were \$1.38 excluding and \$1.52 including the refundable portion of the excess profits tax. With earnings up and the excess profits tax being reduced to 60% from 100%, some improvement in these figures may be expected in 1946 provided the earning trend continues it is felt.

Working capital at Sept. 30, 1945, amounted to \$289,888 as compared with \$221,138 at Dec. 31, 1944.

With earnings considerably increased during the first nine months of the present year and with a very favorable working capital position, shareholders may reasonably expect increased dividends at the end of the current year, Burns Bros. & Denton state in a current investment letter.
