The boys are housed in a notably fine group of brick buildings equipped with every convenience the original designers could think for the comfort of the German naval cadets, who are now represented only by numerous action pictures painted on the walls and Mrs. J. Reid, Mrs. F. Kennedy, of the rooms. The barracks has the appearance of a large university complete with campus and a four-hundred Secretary & Supervisor Capt, Johnny Gray of Acton, Ontario.

Renamed the "Maple Leaf Barracks," each building of the group commemorates one of the battles in Northwest Europe in which Canadian troops were engaged. "Caen" and "Leopold Canal" are typical names The central block is named "Dominion," and was formerly the mess hall

for the entire camp of 4,000 men.
