Because crops of 70-75 million bushels have appeared to satisfy normal requirements in recent years, the prospect is for a scarcity of potatoes in months to come, with imports partly filling the gap. In every province the crop was less, Quebec, Nova Scotia, New Brunswick and Ontario having decreases of more than 30 per cent. In the two main shipping provinces, Prince Edward Island and New Brunswick, the total reduction was nearly seven million bushels.
