Armed Sailor Fires On Officers in Milton Yesterday

Provincial Officer Lemon and Chief Frank McNiven Have Narrow Escape when Fired on at Point Blank Range - Sailor Made Getaway in Bread Truck and Left Stolen Car on Main Street

Bullets flew on Main Street in Milton, yesterday afternoon and citizens ducked for cover as Provincial Officer Lemon and Chief Frank McNiven attempted to take into custody a man wearing the uniform of the Royal Canadian Navy...

The sailor had been about town during the day and the officers, being suspicious, questioned him, but he gave satisfactory answers. Before he was released, however, Mr. Stanley Pay drew their attention to the fact that the car he had was the same model as one reported over the radio from Hamilton, as having been stolen at Clapperton's corners that morning...

The sailor was then ordered to proceed with the officers to the county buildings for further questioning and was being taken to the car of Officer Lemon. He is reported to have drawn a revolver from his blouse and fired on the constable, fortunately missing him. He then started to make a getaway up Mill Street and shots were fired after him by the officers. Two bullets hit the car of Andy Fleming, Milton, one piercing the right rear mud guard and the other the rear corner of the body on the right side.

The sailor made his way to the lane beside the Milton Inn and thence to West Mary Street where he commandeered the bread truck and driver for Wonder Bread. He forced the driver to drive him away. The hold-up happened about three-thirty.

A search was immediately started and police of other centres notified of the hold-up and shooting. A ladies fur coat was in the stolen car but there were no other contents of any value.

A report last evening stated that Toronto police picked up a suspect, who had gone to St. Joseph's Hospital in Toronto to have a leg wound treated. The man is described as 28 years old and a discharged sailor with no fixed address. He left the bread truck and driver at the Humber River on the Queen Elizabeth Highway and went into Toronto by some other means. This morning Provincial Constable E. R. Lemon and Chief McNiven went to Toronto in connection with the arrest.

LOCAL BREEDERS PROMINENT AT OAKVILLE SALE
Local breeders were prominent, both as buyers and sellers at the 3rd annual All-Canadian Holstein Sale held October 31 at Oakville. Max Greenberg, Freeman, bought three head for a total of \$2,250, paying \$1,325 to Dymond Bros., Jerseyville, for a two-year-old daughter of the \$14,100 Montvic Renown, \$575 to Rockwood Holsteins, St. Norbert, Manitoba for a two-year-old heifer, and \$350 to Oliver J. Wright, Conestoga, for a yearling heifer.

W. S. Hall, Oakville bought the two year old heifer, Strathaven Juliette, from Jas. R. Henderson, Portsmouth, paying \$1,400. "Juliette" is a well-bred individual in calf to Sonnwill Sovereign, Junior and Reserve Grand Champion at Kempsville Championship Show this year. Henderson bought as a calf at the All-Canadian Sale last year for \$3,000. E. J. Meagher, Oakville, paid \$325 for a seven-months-old heifer consigned by Geo. C. Jackson, Downsview.

Mrs. Anne Meagher, Oakville, secured a yearling heifer of Abegweit breeding for \$775. H. G. Lyons, Norval, bought a yearling bull at \$375 from R. Norman Hogg, Uxbridge. W. P. Laidlaw and Sons, Norval, received \$725 for a four-year-old, Elmer Carney, Georgetown, \$575 for a three year-old, W. L. McBurn, Norval, \$500 for a two-year old heifer, and Robinson Bros., Georgetown, \$300 for a yearling heifer.

Farm wages were \$66.37 a month in Canada in May of this year, in 1940 they were \$36.02 a month.
