As the customary silver casket was unobtainable, a model west coast ringnet fishing boat was presented to him instead. It bears the title: "The Freedom of N. 1945."

Campbelltown is the headquarters of the west coast herring industry. Mr. Johnston is its fifth honorary burgee since the town was made a royal burgh in 1760.
