Six Nominated for Reeve and Two Qualify—Eleven Nominated for Councillors and Six Fill Qualifications—Good Attendance on Friday Night at Nomination Meeting

A goodly number of citizens turned out to the Nomination Meeting on Friday night in Acton. At 8:30, the following were nominated for the various offices:

After the Clerk had declared the nominations closed, R. J. MacArthur was selected chairman for the rate payers meeting.

The members of the various Boards were called upon to give an account of their stewardship.

Reeve J. M. McDonald was the first called upon. He declared that Acton was the best municipality in Ontario with the best spirit of co-operation. He cited the War Services League which has raised \$1000 for the members of the services. He stated that more water mains would have to be laid next year and urged that all who wanted water should make their application at the beginning of the year so that arrangements could be made. A new reservoir had been erected this year which had greatly increased the water supply and it should be adequate for years to come. He felt the taxes of the Corporation had been spent economically and wisely. More revenue will be available from the war workers with new customers boarded. It was impossible for Mr. McDonald to stand for Reeve for the coming year. He thanked the officials, trustees, employees and all who had helped him conduct the affairs of the town.

Councillor J. H. Creighton was the next called upon. He stated that the Reeve had given a very complete record of what took place last year. The Council had put in long hours to do the business of the year. He could not object to running for Reeve but had not the time to give necessary for the Reveship.

Councillor W. J. Oakes, chairman of the Streets and Walks Committee stated that quite a bit of new sidewalk, where none had ever been before, 6,421 square feet of walk, had been laid and the streets had been paved five times. He felt a start should be made on hard surfacing some streets in the town as the work and money spent on them every year would not be wasted.

Councillor J. H. Boulton, chairman of the Fire, Field and Police Committee stated that quite a bit of new fire hoses had been laid and no serious fires the past year. The Brigade is well equipped with mowers. He praised the co-operation of Council and citizens for the help given. He was not running again owing to business reasons.

Chairman C. M. Hansen of the School Board stated that the School Board was run in a businesslike manner. They were carrying on as much as possible under circumstances.

Property owners will also receive another ballot with the following question:

Are you in favor of installing, constructing, erecting and maintaining buildings, machinery, plant and equipment necessary for a complete sewage system and sewage disposal plant at the estimated cost of \$18,000?

There are two columns on the ballot marked "Yes" and "No". If a majority of ratepayers mark their ballot with a cross in the "Yes" column Acton will have a sewerage system installed as soon as materials and labor are available. If the majority registers a "No" vote the town will sit back while other towns secure this asset and progress. This is purely up to the property owners.

Members of the School Board elected by acclamation for a two year term were Dr. F. G. Oakes, J. A. Chapman and G. A. Dills and Mr. C. Hansen was elected to be the Public Utilities Commissioner for a two year term.
