## CARE OF MACHINERY WHEN NOT IN USE

Here are some general rules for the care of machinery when not in use. Protect polished surfaces from rust by covering with a heavy body grease. Protect against wind and weather by adequate painting. Remove and dry storage canvas, rubber belts and rubber tires, unless the machine is properly housed. Where tires are left on the machine being stored for long periods, the load should be removed from the tires. Support all working parts away from the ground. Protect machinery from fire, stock and poultry. Drain radiators, fuel tanks and carburetors, and cover motor openings against moisture and dust.
