TORONTO (CP) - Premier Diew gave the Dominion government soarething to think about between now and the next meeting of the Dominion-provincial Conference on January 28, when he opposed the government's August proposals and put forward the idea of a National Adjustment Fund

The Ontario government refuses to give Ottawn the right to tax personal and corporation income and estates in return for fixed grants-in-aid based on population. As a counterproposal, Mr Drew favors the establishment of a National Adjustment Fund, with all the provinces contribtuing 10 per cent of personal income BILL ROBINSON and corporation taxes and succession duties, this fund to aid those provinces which are unable to provide a minimum standard of social service It is estimated the fund would

amount to \$20,000,000 annually In the 12,000-word submission, prepared for the next session of the conference. Ontario claims that the alof the Dominion's proposals "would be the ultimate abandonment of the federal system in favor of a unitary system of government in Canada

The province disagreed as well with the Dominion proposal for old age pensions of \$40 a month, without a means test, for all persons 70 and over and \$30 or less a month. with a means test to those aged to-69 The Ontario suggestion is that all over 65 receive a pension regardless of means "as soon as the Dominion finds it has the necessary financial resources

One of the 11 objections submitted by the province refers to the field' of health services. Ontario contends that when the cost of proposed beauth services is added to its curtained 1945-1946 budget, the prosposed I's me ' inton subsidies would leave a defeit of \$15,(4x),(Xx).

Ontario is the first of the nine pluvinces to refuse the Dominton's taxation proposals. It was feared in some quarters that history would repeat the episode at the first conference in 1941 when Mitchell Hepburn withdrew arguing that wartime was . not the time to remould the constitution. . Health Minister . Claxton, however, expressed confidence that the discussions would "proceed speed-

In its conclusion the submission states that national income depends largely on the dollar value of the Dominion's export trade and that cooperation of all governments and people of Canada is needed to meet Vigorous competition from other nations in export markets.
