TORONTO (CP)—Premier Drew gave the Ontario government something to think about between now and the next meeting of the Dominion-provincial Conference on January 28, when he opposed the government's August proposals and put forward the idea of a National Adjustment Fund.

The Ontario government refuses to give Ottawa the right to tax personal and corporate income and estates in return for fixed grants-in-aid based on population. As a counter-proposal, Mr. Drew favors the establishment of a National Adjustment Fund, with all the provinces contributing 10 per cent of personal income and corporation taxes and succession duties, this fund to aid those provinces which are unable to provide a minimum standard of social service. It is estimated the fund would amount to \$20,000,000 annually.

In the 12,000-word submission, prepared for the next session of the conference, Ontario claims that the almost inevitable result of acceptance of the Dominion's proposals "would be the ultimate abandonment of the federal system in favor of a unitary system of government in Canada."

Another proposal put forward by Mr. Drew was for a permanent Dominion-provincial Co-ordinating Committee made up of Dominion and provincial premiers or their appointees, to provide constant adjustment of intergovernmental difficulties and solution of legislative and administrative problems.

But Ontario is firm in urging the Dominion vacate entirely such tax fields as succession duties, gasoline, amusement, race track parimutuels, security transfers and electricity.

Pension Question The province disagreed as well with the Dominion proposal for old age pensions of \$30 a month, with-out a means test, for all persons 70 and over and \$30 or less a month, with a means test to those aged 65-69. The Ontario suggestion is that all over 65 receive a pension regardless of means "as soon as the Dominion finds it has the necessary financial resources."

One of the 11 objections submitted by the province refers to the field of health services. Ontario contends that when the cost of proposed health services is added to its curtailed 1945-1946 budget, the proposed Dominion subsidies would leave a deficit of \$15,000,000.

Ontario is the first of the nine provinces to refuse the Dominion's taxation proposals. It was feared in some quarters that history would repeat the episode at the first conference in 1941 when Mitchell Hepburn withdrew arguing that wartime was not the time to remould the constitution. Health Minister Claxton, however, expressed confidence that the discussions would "proceed speedily to a successful conclusion."

In its conclusion the submission states that national income depends largely on the dollar value of the Dominion's export trade and that co-operation of all governments and people of Canada is needed to meet vigorous competition from other nations in export markets.
