LETTER FROM GREECE TELLS HOW CLOTHING IS APPRECIATED

The need to assist the people of those countries which have had the scourge of war is revealed in a letter received recently by Mrs. Hugh M. Reid, R. R. 2, Acton. Two years ago, Mrs. Reid gave to the clothing appeal a shirt. She attached a note giving her name and address. Here is the answer she received a week or so ago. It tells the whole story.

To Mrs. Hugh M. Reid, R. R. 2, Acton, Ont., Canada.

29th of October, 1945 Dear Mrs. Reid:

Your shirt came to me only yesterday, 28th of October, 1945. I see by your kind note that it is nearly a year ago that you were kind enough to give it for relief (Jan. 29, 1944).

I would like to let you know what pleasure it gave me, and please believe me when I tell you that it is my only shirt, except the one I had on.

I am an employee of the Greek Red Cross and father of two grown-up daughters, but though we work as much as we can, the money we get is just sufficient for our board, and that a very meager one.

But we have courage, for we have friends, you are one of them, you, who kindly gave this shirt that gave me such pleasure and was so needed. Thanking you again, I remain,

By-laws Passed and Provision Made for Election of Area School Trustee

The inaugural meeting of Esqueing Township Council was held at eleven o'clock on January 14th. After subscribing to the oath of office, the members took their seats. G. W. Murray, Reeve; George E. Cleave, Deputy-reeve; George Currie, C. H. May and R. N. Brown, Councillors.

Mr. G. W. McLintock, manager of the Bank of Commerce, was present, congratulating the Council on the financial standing of the Township. Mr. McLintock has taken a great interest in Township affairs for many years and his valued assistance has always been appreciated. Reeve Murray on behalf of the members of Council expressed his thanks for the assistance given.

Council resumed the session at 2:30 that afternoon.

Application was made to the Department of Highways for the statutory grant on an expenditure of \$29,826.38 for 1945.

A grant of \$10 was made to the Salvation Army and the fee of \$5 paid to the Good Road's Association.

Accounts passed included the following: Georgetown Hydro Board, re street lights, \$71.50; Brampton Hydro re street lights, \$4.05; Bell Telephone Co., \$7.24; Letter Shop Supply Co., \$77.27; Municipal World, \$4.86; Acton Free Press, \$3.00; I. M. Bennett, re Voters' List and Old Age Pensions, \$20.00; Postmaster Georgetown, re rent, \$2.00; A. W. Benton, stamps, \$3.00.

Road accounts passed amounted to \$1,051.43 and relief accounts \$5.03.

J. H. Bingham was appointed a member of the Board of Health and William Campbell Wood Inspector.

Assessors appointed were Cecil Chisholm for Wards 1, 2, and 3 and Arthur W. Benton for Wards 4, 5 and 6.

A by-law was passed providing for holding a municipal election to fill the vacancy on the School Board for Area No. 1.

Another by-law authorized the borrowing of sums up to \$35,000 to meet current expenditures.

Council will meet again on February 2nd.
