HOURS OF SALE OUTLINED IN GARAGE OPERATORS MEETING

The first general meeting of 1946 of the Garage Operators Association, Hallow Branch, was held in the Old Fellow Hall, Milton, on January 7th. President Red Waumsley was in the chair. As the meeting was called for a thorough discussion on three subjects, the entertainment part of the meeting was eliminated. The first matter discussed was the Industrial Standards Act. After hearing everyone's opinion on the matter, it was unanimously decided that the one and only thing the Branch desired from the Act was to regulate the hours of sale of gasoline.

Not losing sight of the public's opinion and that of the Motor League and the Oil Companies, a motion was presented and adopted that the hours be from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. week days, 7 a.m. to 10 p.m. Saturdays and a day preceding a holiday and 7 a.m. to 10 p.m. on Sundays, these hours to be the maximum. It was felt that this would work no hardship on any one. The committee now alternating on Sundays could still do so, and the out-of-town operators could open or close as they saw fit. A motion was then brought forward that the secretary contact the Head Office and request that their field man cover the county with a petition to this effect. Upon completion of the circulation of this petition, if favorable, we would contact the Industry Board for a hearing.

The second discussion re cut prices on gasoline, was quickly dispensed with due to the fact that it was the attitude of everyone that there was not a thing that could be done about it.

The third discussion re the tire discount problem brought out some interesting points and it was felt that this situation could be directly attributed to some tire firms setting up their dealers as distributors and in turn giving them special discounts. The secretary was therefore authorized by a motion which was carried unanimously, to write the major tire companies and complain about this condition and ask if they could not do something about it. Barring this, we would try as a group to get one company to set us up as a distributor and any extra discounts would be given out at the end of the year on a pro rata basis.

The auditor's report was read and the books turned over to the new treasurer. The Branch is in a sound financial position. With the serving of coffee and sandwiches, the meeting came to a close.

Officials Named for the Year and By-laws Passed at First Meeting

Reeve J. Arthur Swackhammer, Deputy Reeve Goldwin Burr and Councillors Geo. D. Scott, Albert Wheeler and Harold T. Griffin, signed the Declaration of Office and took their seats as the Municipal Council of Erin Township for the year 1946, on January 7th.

Council proceedings opened with the reading of the scripture by the Rev. Mr. Turner and prayer by the Rev. Mr. Fuenman. By-laws were given the necessary readings and passed determining the remuneration of members of Council and officials, appointing a member of the Local Board of Health, the appointing of officials and also one for borrowing money from the Royal Bank of Hillsburg to meet the current expenditures for the year.

Officials appointed for the year are as follows: Clerk, Geo. Bryan, Treasurer, Daniel Gray, Collector, A. J. Lindsay, Health Officer, R. S. McCullough, solicitor, C. L. McKinnon, school attendance officer, Harvey Denton, ward inspector, R. S. McCullough, member of Board of Health, J. E. Penton.

Council authorized the payment of membership fees to the Ontario Municipal Association and the Ontario Good Roads Association and delegates were named to attend these conventions.

The treasurer's bond for \$15,000 with the Canadian Security Co. was renewed and also fire insurance on the Crawler Tractor for actual cash value with the Pilot Insurance Co.

The following resolutions were moved and carried: That the treasurer be authorized to pay from time to time on requisition of the telephone commission, amounts sufficient to meet the operating expenses of the telephone system.

The collector is instructed to collect all outstanding taxes that are collectable and to return the balance according to law.

The Clerk was instructed to order nine copies of the Municipal World for use of council and officials.

Notice was given that at the next meeting of council a by-law will be introduced for the purpose of authorizing the assessor to collect dog tax at time of making the assessment.

A motion confirming the payment of accounts by the treasurer for the period between December 15 and December 31 totalling \$328.76 was passed.

Accounts were passed as follows: General, \$157.75; Sheep, \$118.00; Relief, \$89.93; Road, \$2,947.69.
