These insects and diseases assault the borders of Canada by road, rail, sea and air.

Inspectors are stationed at all the main points of entrance and exit in the Dominion. In the latest report of the Dominion Minister of Agriculture, it is recorded that even under war conditions no fewer than 15,468,879 plants were inspected during the year under review.

TORONTO (CP)—Dairy farmers of Canada heard good news from federal officials concerning prospective markets for the coming year at their annual meeting in Niagara Falls.

An unprecedented opportunity exists for introducing Canadian dairy products in European markets, particularly in France and Belgium, according to J. H. Tremblay of Edmonton, a Dominion government agricultural trade commissioner.

Before the war Britain produced only 30 per cent. of its food requirements; France followed a policy of self-sufficiency and Belgium imported mainly cereal foods.

Canada has contracted to supply the United Kingdom a total of 125,000,000 pounds of cheese at 20 cents per pound, the quantity and price to be the same as specified in the present contract.

Plans for Ontario's six industrial farms which will eliminate many of the existing county jails, call for complete segregation of prisoners into age and type groups.

Provincial Secretary George Dunbar announced that there will be cells only in the sections where hardened and incorrigible prisoners are held.

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GLACE BAY, N. S. (CP) Production from the 11 collieries of the Dominion Coal Company in Cape Breton dropped off during 1945—and the two weeks holidays granted all miners was one of the main causes of the decline.

During the summer months, all mines suspended operations for a week while the employees went on vacation—with pay—an agreement reached between the mine operators and the miners' union.

Acton Wins One And Loses One In Week's Games

Acton carried the initiative from the first and Brown staved off Acton rushes in a brilliant display of net minding. E. Marzo broke the ice for Acton when he scored at 9:45 unassisted.

During the next few minutes Elora played the best hockey, but Woods successfully held them off until at 18:50 N. Morton, on a pass from his brother "Bus" alarmed the puck home and made the count 2-0 for Acton.

Referee Jones however, failed to see any resemblance between hand and stick and sent Goy off for interference at 4:30.

With both teams back at full strength, I. Marzo broke away from the face-off and scored on a solo rush at 9:00. Elora, in their eagerness to count, attempted to stave the Acton rushes and Steffler in his over-exuberance boarded a Tanner at 10:10 and received a minor penalty.

At 14:30 N. Morton, assisted by Bayliss and Townsley, on a brilliant exhibition of co-operation, scored to make the tally at the end of the second period 5-0.

Hardly had the third period begun when Lindsay scored on a pass from I. Marzo at 1:15. I. Marzo missed an opportunity when he flashed through the entire Elora team but, failed to beat Brown.

"Poridge" Riddall ended up in the penalty box when he tripped a Rock at 7:35. In a fight in the Acton end with participants including Bayliss, Goy, Townsley, Miller, Steffler and Schist, resulted in Townsley and Miller winding up in the penalty box at 8:00.

E. Marzo counted his second time in the game when he caught a rebound and pushed the pill past Brown at 12:45. Riddall and Dargel visited the penalty box at 16:05 as they touched it in the corner.

To wind up the game and to score his fourth goal of the game, N. Morton flickered the flame at 19:15 to give Acton an outstanding victory over the Rocks.

Ontario Village Free of Crimes

Claim Stirling is Best Equipped of Its Size in Dominion

STIRLING, Ont. (CP)—A unique claim spot in Ontario is this community of 1,017 just north of Belleville.

G. H. Luery, clerk of the village, which was incorporated in 1860, says "we never had any boys in jail. Juvenile delinquency doesn't exist here. We believe in rearing our children as responsible citizens."

That "crime wave" ended with the appointment of Sam Eggleston, six-foot-two, as constable. He is on duty from 9 p.m. to 6 a.m. and some say that would-be lawbreakers are scared away when they see his large form in the distance.

HOW TO MAKE ROPE LAST MUCH LONGER

Even though wartime demands for rope are over and rope fibre-producing areas occupied by the enemy are now liberated, there still is not enough rope to meet all the demands for it.

The life of rope can be extended by keeping it dry. If the rope about to be used has been dampened by snow or rain, dry it before using. It is also wise to dry rope before coiling it for storage.

The surface wear of rope can be reduced by taking greater care in handling it, for example, in preventing it from being dragged along the ground and from rubbing against beams or posts in the barn or chafed by rubbing against the edges of poorly designed pulley blocks.
