The league leading Orangeville Greenhorns were a disappointment to Acton fans and easy picking for the Tanners on their appearance here on Tuesday night. The Orangeville team had beaten most every team in the group and the Gillespie boys were heralded as perfect pests to the opposing goalies and fans anticipated a close struggle.

The Orangeville boys have been stinging well but it's only in the last three games that the Tanners have buckled down to serious hockey and Orangeville had not encountered such organized play before. The Tanners were clicking 100 per cent. on Tuesday and the Orangeville boys were a very disorganized squad with some individual work that came out in spurts and accounted for four goals while Acton piled up twelve. The Orangeville defence was weak in comparison with Acton and they lack experience. Their goalies had about twice as many shots to handle as Acton so that the score is not an indication of the quality of the play.

There was a good crowd of 1104 paid admissions on hand to see the tussle which, in spite of the score, gave all the full value for their admission. The game result rather upsets the group standing and made it quite a scramble with most of the teams having a chance for one of the first four to make a play-off berth. Acton fans were delighted at the improved showing of the Tanners and the stride they have now made. It put them in second place. But here's the story of how the boys got their vitamins from the oranges.

At 4:15 Ralph Gillespie opened the scoring when he pushed one past Woods and put the visitors in the lead. Acton was not long in retaliating and I. Marzo assisted by E. Marzo and "Dude" Lindsay evened the count at 5:02. At 8:00 Lindsay put Acton ahead when he scored from I. Marzo.

Acton team and Woods had to do some fancy net minding to hold the score 2-1 at 16:40. Ralph Gillespie was chased off the ice by Referee Jones in Jones Bay for holding. Acton was quick to take advantage of their extra man and I. Marzo scored at 17:10 on a rebound from Lindsay's shot.

From the face-off, N. Morton added a tally to Acton's total when Townsley assisted him in a classy play at 0:50.

MacDonald, the Orangeville net minder made numerous saves on rushes by the Acton team, but Dude Lindsay beat him out at 4:22 from a face-off in the Orangeville end. Gillespie again succeeded in eluding the Acton team and scored again at 7:10. At 7:22 Dang Kentner received a penalty for roughing and while Acton was short-handed Lindsay scored again assisted by Baylis to make the score 6-2. Hardly had Dang stepped on the ice when Jones sent E. Marzo to the cooler for reasons as yet undetermined, at 9:45 brother Ho followed "Dang" to the penalty box at 12:40 for boarding Hoare.

"Dude" Lindsay on a scoring spree netted Acton three goals in rapid succession. The first at 13:30 and the second at 13:30 were on assists by the Marzo brothers while the third at 19:10 was on a rebound from his own shot. "Dang" Stewart, the Leafs one and only, has nothing on Lindsay's 3 goals in 4 minutes. Stewart's record, 3 goals in 5 minutes. The second period ended Acton 9, Orangeville 2.

N. Morton opened the scoring in the third frame at 1:35 when he scored on a rebound from MacDonald's aids. When Harden tripped Gillespie at 4:15 he received a minor penalty and while Acton was short-handed G. Gillespie brought Orangeville back into the game and scored at 6:08.
