Survey of Streams

Depleted Sports Fishing Lakes To Be Rehabilitated With Stock

HALIFAX (CT) -- The Nova Scotia department of Industry and Publicity has embarked on a program to rehabthitate the sports fishing streams and goods and services which the employlakes of this province. The first step er sells. was to be a survey of all main fishing streams, to obtain the information needed for a scientific approach to the problem.

Dr. Douglas L. Cooper, fisheries director of the province, has announced ology at Dalhousie University, has been retained by the department to supervise the survey and make recommendations to the provincial gov-

ernment. There was more to the problem than filling depleted streams with hatchery stock. Dr. Cooper explained, Unless conditions were favorable for fish life, the streams and "lakes so stocked would be depleted again in short time.

The fisheries director said no complete survey had ever been made in Nova Scotia and consequently the department had to start at the beginning Maine and New Hampshire have made these surveys On the basis of the information obtained, that "substantial progress" had been they have been able to rehabilitate successfully many of their fishing streams.
