Aberfoyle Store and Post Office Destroyed by Fire

Flames consumed one of Puslinch district's oldest buildings Sunday afternoon when McLean's general store and post office at Aberfoyle was gutted. Only the shell of the structure, and part of the second floor living quarters remain. None of the contents were saved.

The blaze was noticed shortly after two o'clock. Volunteers quickly realized that it had too great a start for them to control and a plea for aid was telephoned to Guelph fire department. A hose pumper truck responded with a crew of six men.

Cause of the fire has not been determined. The store and living quarters were heated by coal stoves. According to a neighbor who helped the elderly proprietress tend the fires, however, the stoves had been in a normal condition a short time before the blaze was discovered.

Miss Grace McLean, postmistress at Aberfoyle and owner-operator of the general store, was born in the building. She is the only surviving child of Mr. and Mrs. James McLean who were among the village's pioneer settlers. Miss McLean had spent three quarters of a century there.
