#### HALTON HEALTH SERVICE SUBJECT AT BLOOMSBURY SCHOOL

Mr R Heatherington, Federation of Agriculture Fieldman for Halton showed several aplended films on Wednesday afternoon and evening, in Bloomsbury School, S. S. No. 9, Nav-MERNEYA

The following pictures were enjoyed by all:

"Tennessee Valley Project", showing the value and necessity of wientlike farming in the Tennessee Valley, where tons of good surface soil are being washed into the rivers and on to the sea yearly by the heavy rains and the subsequent flowly, leaving the farm land, stony and rutted with gulleys and the farmers in despair. At last the government came to the rescue and a series of dams were built on the rivers running through the valles, contour plowing was introduced, commercial fertilizers were provided and used, and referestration was advocated, with the result that in a few years great fields of corn, tobacco and cats were grown on the hills and in the valleys which had been almost barren previously

The operation of lobster fishing was shown in "Trappers Of The Sea" a beautiful colored film showing the hazards and thrills of obtaining 'this delicious food

"Ottawa on the River", another technicolor picture showed that beautiful old city in its flower-decked dress of summer, with its winding boulevards, grassy parks, imposing buildings including the parliament buildings and comfortable homes, and in winter with a mantle of snow covering every place, it provides a paradisc for the sportsman, with its skating rinks and ski slides. The audience also had the privilege of hearing Miss Reta Sutcliffe, Senfor Public Health Nurse of the Halton County School Health Service. Miss Sutcliffe was introduced by Mr. Heatherington and spoke on the present school service which was organazed in August 1945 and the need for a more generalized health service, as a County Health Unit would be, la which all phases of health work are included. The need was stressed that all children entering school should be in good physical condition and immunized against diptheria, whooping cough and small pox, so that their school progress would be such as all parents desire. She said, "Nasangaweya is to be congratulated on its splendid dental service," which unfortunately, some parents still do not take advantage of She stressed! the fact that good nutrition was necessary for health and while parents in this country could live an adequate diet, many children do not get a balsneed diet. The film shown by Mr. Heatherington a month ago "Vitamins A, B. C and D" illustrated the re-
