Western Community Turns From Grain

MELVILLE, Sask. (CP) — This southeastern Saskatchewan farming community may be in the golden grain belt but grain ceased to be its major concern many years ago. Dairy and chicken farms have replaced the fields of grain which failed to flourish in Melville's light soil. And now, though only 121 carloads of grain were shipped from Melville elevators last year, the district's poultry and dairy producers reaped a payment of something like \$2,500,000 last year from produce houses for their products.

The change came about gradually during the last 20 years. Creameries and produce houses which had the foresight to see it coming, installed plants to take care of the business they rightly supposed would result. From land plots now reduced to an average of a half-section, the Melville district last year shipped 126 carloads of livestock by rail, 327 tons of dressed poultry, 1,746 tons of eggs, or 62,000 thirty dozen cases and 865 tons of butter. In addition there was a vast quantity of produce trucked out of Melville.

Town officials, with Melville's future in mind, are promoting the dairy-livestock industry with formation of an agricultural committee which intends to organize swine and calf clubs. They see establishment of meat packing plants and an abattoir here as the next logical step. Only dark spot on Melville's future is lack of water, which it now gets mainly from wells. Annual consumption is about 20,000,000 gallons and on occasion it has been necessary to obtain water from a nearby railway dam to supplement the supply.

However, a water project at Crooked Lake, 22 miles south, is planned and if completed, officials believe it will ensure a future of development and prosperity for Melville.

FARMERS HAPPY

HALIFAX (CP)—Farmers within a radius of 10 to 15 miles of Brooklyn, Nova Scotia, are feeling pleased with the progress of their business venture, the Brooklyn Co-operative Society, the Nova Scotia department of agriculture reports the society has completed its third year and had a volume of business of \$250,000.

Architect's Sketch of the Elevation of New Bank of Montreal Building



Of contemporary classical design, the new Bank of Montreal building, reproduced here from the architect's sketch of the elevation, will dominate one of Toronto's busiest street intersections. On the north-west corner of King and Bay Streets, the building extends more than 150 feet northward on Bay and 94 feet west on King. The bank's main Toronto office and the assistant general manager's department for Ontario, will occupy the first four floors and basement of the building. Rising 16 stories to a height of 224 feet, the other twelve floors are to be occupied by a variety of commercial and financial tenants.
