CHARLES J. MORTON Many friends here will regret to learn of the passing away on Saturday of Charles J. Morton, son of Thomas and the late Mrs. Morton. He had been in ill health since last June and died at Highland Park General Hospital, Detroit, Mich. He was forty-six years old.

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Report of Five Year's Work of Busy Bees Club

The No. 7 Nassagaweya, Busy Bees Club end five years of War Work with receipts of \$6,305.08 and 1945 receipts of \$2,194.25. The past year we held 17 dances during the summer months; a bazaar in the fall, progressive euchres in March and April last spring and again in January and February this winter. We made and sold and quilted 42 quilts and made one and sent it to the Salvation Army and had one quilt draw.

Collections taken at meeting for Good Cheer amounted to \$11.45 and each member gave her Red Cross contribution last spring to the Club and it is counted in donation receipts. The Club packed and sent 33 boys' boxes, which is where nearly all the postage accrued. Cigarettes were sent to the same boys, spaced every other month alternate with the boxes. The Good Cheer convenor reported 81 cards sent to convalescents and in sympathy, flowers to a neighbor soldier, boy who had been in a train accident, 24 boxes to the sick in the community and a wreath was placed on the Cenotaph. The roll call had 24 names and an average attendance of 10 members at each monthly meeting. The high-light of the year was the Welcome Home of six of our ten boys namely: Cpl. Karl Frank; Sgt. Frank Allen; Gnr. George Wallace; Sgt. James Wallace; Pte. Glenn Britton and Signm. Gordon Allen. Financial summing up:
