Mr J M McDonald, Acton, presented the report of the Consultative Committee on Faturation at a special meeting of Halton County Council held in Milton last Thursday night This committee was formed to inquire into the advisability of establishing larger High behool Areas in the county as recommended by the Provinclai Department of Education.
