#### Pianist Tells of rHardships of South American Tour

WINNIPEG (CP) Competing with the musical tastes of red ants was only one of the difficulties encountered by Gordon Kushner, Winnipeg planist who recently returned from a 3-month concert tour through South America.

Competition from the ants - some of them half an inch long-came at Panama City, one of the stops on the tour of 16 countries he made as accompanist to Portis White, the wellknown contralto from Halifax.

"At times it becomes a question of teading music or killing ants,". Mr. Kushner said.

Attention to music was made difficult at Grenada, British West Indies, too. A colored gentleman wearing a hat, followed by a victous-looking mongrel dog, paraded between the stage and the front row there.


