Obituary

ANGUS KENNEDY

The funeral was held Tuesday of Angus Kennedy, late of Sodom, Nasagaweya Township. Rev. Mr. McNeil of Campbellville conducted a service at the home, assisted by Rev. C. L. Poole of Moffat.

Funeralbearers were John Carton, Edward Mahon, M. Holmes, F. Freeman, Robert Anderson and G. Kingsbury. Interment was in Nasagaweya Cemetery.

Mr. Kennedy died at his home last Saturday after an illness which lasted 8 years. He had spent his life farming on Lot 14, Concession 4, Nasagaweya Township, until he retired to Sodom in 1944. He was in his 76th year.

Born in Hamilton, he was a son of the late Charles Kennedy and Mary McNear, members of a pioneer family in that district. He was a member of Nasagaweya Presbyterian Church.

Never married, he is survived only by one brother and two sisters: Frank and George of Sodom; Miss Amy Kennedy, Sodom; and Miss Mary Kennedy, Campbellville.

SUCCESS WITH POTATOES

The results of experimental work and demonstrations indicate that five factors contribute largely to success in potato production: 1. Use certified seed of a suitable variety; 2. A plentiful supply of plant food supplied through crop rotation, the use of barnyard manure, artificial fertilizers and green manure crops; 3. Early planting; 4. Efficient protection of the foliage of the plants throughout the growing season from insects and fungus diseases by thorough dusting or spraying; 5. Proper methods in harvesting, grading, packaging and labelling.

Thirteenth Power Bill Shows Largest Surplus on Record

so that there was no interruption in the water service. A motion was passed making the salary of Supt. Wilson \$2700 per year, commencing with May 15th. The thirteenth power bill was presented. It showed that for 1945 the cost of power purchased amounted to \$10,994.32. Acton's share of operating costs and fixed charges were: operating, \$2,603.90; interest, \$13,822.33; provision for renewals, \$3,037.38; provision for contingencies, \$4,670.20; sinking fund, \$3,569.00; revenue in excess of power sold to private companies, \$1,801.25; total cost of power, \$42,955.88. Amount of accounts rendered at interim rates \$48,285.68. A rebate of \$5,329.80 was due the local Commission on the year's operation of hydro. This is the largest rebate received by the local Commission.
