(Continued from Page One) - At 1:45 Presbytery met with Presbyterial to hear a message from Dr. Gordon Agnew, West China University, Chengtu, West China...

On adjournment at 12:15 p.m. the Presbytery sat down to lunch with the ladies of the United Church, where the ladies of the local organization served a bounteous and wholesome meal.

The Nominating Committee met during the noon hour to draft the list of convener and committees for the new conference year. The slate, as presented to Presbytery, was endorsed.

At 1:45 Presbytery met with Presbyterial to hear a message from Dr. Gordon Agnew, West China University, Chengtu, West China. His address was of the usual highly inspirational and intellectual nature...

Charging that Canada is so comfortable, so luxurious and so complacent that it is seriously and tragically insensitive to what is going on in the rest of the world...

Missionary in China for many years, Dr. Agnew returned there in 1942 taking with him large supplies of relief goods. During those four years' experience, he said, he had gained a close understanding of some of the conditions in the Far East.

"No topic relates more closely to you and me," he declared later in his address, stating boldly that China, having discovered that she could fight and take it, might depart from her historic championing of the peaceful way...

"The post-war era is upon us. Are we proud of it?" asked Dr. Agnew, pointing to strife, civil war, the United States and the British Empire's desire to keep their own life line...

The afternoon session of the Presbytery commenced with a brief worship period under the leadership of Rev. R. E. Mercer. Reports of the various committees of Presbytery were presented, discussed and dealt with.

Rev. George Service of Zion United Church, Hamilton, spoke to the Presbytery regarding the Pension Fund Capital Campaign as it applies to the Hamilton Conference. He reported that the general canvass is going well...

The names of Rev. E. B. Eddy of Oakville and the chairman were nominated as Commissioner from Presbytery to the General Council. After two votes, Rev. E. B. Eddy was elected on the withdrawal of the chairman, Mr. B. F. Sanderson...

Presbytery passed a motion expressing its gratitude to the minister and the officials of Acton Baptist Church for the fine Christian spirit exhibited by them in allowing Presbytery the use of their church for the meeting of a Presbytery of the United Church.

The meeting was adjourned at 5:45 p.m. to meet at conference in Guelph on Wednesday, May 29th at 9 a.m.

(Continued from Page One) - Council passed a resolution authorizing the treasurer to pay accounts for casual labor upon production of a voucher authorized by the Municipal Officer.

A letter from Miss Rita Maltby, Toronto, requested use of the park for July 1st for the Maltby reunion. Council decided they could not give exclusive rights to the park on a public holiday but if no ball game or sports were scheduled for that day, the group could use the park free of charge if all debts were cleared away following the reunion.

Chief Harrop reported he had a visit from the County Assessor and outlined some forms required. It was necessary to secure the measurement of all lots to get an accurate assessment. The county assessor had no forms and had set up no office yet so that information was not available on new procedure necessary.

NASSAGAWEYA W. I. ANNUAL MEETING ELECTION OF OFFICERS

The annual meeting of the Nassagaweya Women's Institute was held at the home of Mrs. Frank Rhinehart. The president, Mrs. F. Freeman, occupied the chair while the business of the year was finished. The roll call was answered by the payment of membership fees for the coming year. Reports were given by the secretary-treasurer and the treasurer of the Flower Fund. The secretary-treasurer reported total receipts \$1309.70 and expenditures \$1006.52 leaving a balance of \$303.18. The Flower Fund treasurer reported total receipts \$397.1 and expenditures \$29.16 leaving a balance of \$367.95.

THE NEW VENTURE OF SOCIAL CREDIT

Premier Manning of Alberta, speaking in regard to his proposed Bill to provide an income of \$600 a year to all over the age of 19 asked, not for criticism for the present measure, but for suggestions showing how this objective could be attained. Premier Manning is not without wisdom. When a man wants miracles he must dig up a miracle man. The problem is one of issuing Credit Certificates and making them worth their face value in all transactions. It will not be easy.

The Bill is entitled "An Act Respecting the Rights of Alberta Citizens." Under this legislation any person, male or female, between the ages of 19 and 60 will, when out of work, receive a pension of \$50 a month, \$600 a year paid, of course, in Alberta Credit Certificates of unknown value. Alberta should be a happy country. The Federal Government provides "Family Allowance" for the children until they reach 16. Strengthened by this they go on their own until they reach 19. Then the Government of Alberta steps in and provides a Social Security Pension of \$50 a month that is, to those who are out of work.

When 60 they retire from work on an old age pension "which" according to the new Bill, "shall be equal at least to the Security Pension previously mentioned." The Alberta citizen who can live three years of the allotted span without government aid is as snug as a bug in a rug - those who can't must take their chances.
