TORONTO (CP)—Ontario farmers shortly will receive 29,000 cheques from the Dominion government as their per bushel payment from the Ontario wheat equalization fund.

The payment, at three cents a bushel, will be made to producers who delivered Ontario winter wheat in the 1944-45 crop year on the basis of monthly reports received from elevator agents in Ontario.

The surplus arising as a result of the equalization fees collected on Ontario winter flour and other wheat products exported from that crop, after allowing for administration costs and the estimated cost of making the payment, totals \$192,824.77.

Ontario farmers also will participate in \$4,108,932 being distributed in barley equalization payments to all producers who delivered barley either through country elevators or by farm-to-farm transactions in the crop year 1944-45. The barley payment is being made before the wheat distribution.

Approximately 155,000 barley cheques are involved, covering total deliveries of 80,635,781 bushels, with the payment per bushel set at 7.59 cents.

The barley equalization payment represents the difference between the advance equalization payment and the equalization fees collected for barley exported, after allowing for administration costs and the estimated cost of making payment. The payment covers deliveries made between Aug. 1, 1944 and July 31, 1945.

In the case of deliveries through country elevators, the cheques are compiled from information submitted by the handling companies. Where producers made deliveries to more than one elevator, separate cheques will be issued, one for each of the companies to which deliveries were made.

The cheques will be forwarded to the elevator companies for distribution when completed, but cheques covering the farm-to-farm transactions will be distributed by mail from Ottawa.

It is considered probable in Ottawa that wheat participation certificates on the 1943-44 crop will be ready for the mail in June.

The shortage of barbed wire, a handicap to farmers during the war years, is expected to continue for some time until deliveries of steel from the United States are back to normal.

Barbed wire production in Canada amounts to about 1,000 tons a month and this is distributed on an equitable basis throughout Canada.

Between 3,600 and 4,000 prisoners of war will be available for farm work in at least the early part of the summer according to the federal minister of labor, Humphrey Mitchell. About 900 have been allotted to the Ontario sugar beet area.

The period for which the labor will be available is dependent on arrangements with the British authorities. No assurance can yet be given that they will remain in Canada beyond the early part of August. Most German prisoners already have been sent to Britain where they are to be used in reconstruction work.

HOHOUSE HATS KEPT IN ICEBOX

BOSTON (CP)—Hothouse hats, which bloom at a predetermined date and are kept in the icebox with the milk at night, are the newest fancy in summer headgear.

The hats, which establish a new high in cheapeau glamor, are designed for the wearer and are the origination of Eleanor O'Neill, a Boston florist with a flair for the unusual.

Miss O'Neill has leaved upon science in the creation of her hats since she specializes in designing chapeaux for anniversaries and dates to be remembered, and to do this must be assured of blossoms that flower on the date the customer wants the hat. These flowers are brought into bloom with a new device which maintains constant heat-flow. Scientists who developed the mechanism conducted tests which showed that the flowers could be made to bloom at any predetermined day, thereby assuring Miss O'Neill of the fragrant materials she converts into hats.

The festive bonnets sell for \$10 to \$40 and will last for five days provided they are parked in a refrigerator at night.

"Flower hats provide a new and exciting way of expressing the wearer's personality," says Miss O'Neill. "If she is the glamorously fragile type I use such flowers as gardenias, camellias or carnations in the pale shades. If she is a girl with many different personality facets, I combine the flowers, using some that are exotic and others that are more simple—perhaps a white orchid as the central flower with two or three butterfly orchids and a spray or two of white buddella for fragrance. For a South American brunette who reminded me of Carmen Miranda I made a tiger lily hat and the night she wore it she was a sensation."

Miss O'Neill says she rarely makes two hats alike. "Every girl's personality is different. I try to express her individuality," she explains.
