TORONTO (CP) - Ontario farmers shortly-will receive 29,000 cheques from the Dominion government as their per bushet payment from the Ontario wheat equalization fund.

The payment, at three cents a bushel, will be made to producers who delivered Ontario winter wheat in the 1944-45 crop year on the basis of monthly reports received from elevator agents in Onfario

The surplus arising as a result of the equalization fees collected on Ontarto winter flour and other wheat products exported from that crop, after allowing for administration costs and the estimated rost of making the payment, totals \$192,824 T7.

Ontario farmere elso will participate in \$8,108,932 being distributed in barley equalization payments to all producers who delivered barley either through country elevators or by arm-to-farm transactions in the crop year 1944-45. The barley payment is being made before the wheat distribution.

Approximately 155,000 cheques are involved, covering total deliveries of 80,435,781 bushels, with The meeting of Bannuckburn W. the payment per bushel set at 759

> The barley equalization payment represents the difference between the advance equalization payment and the equalization fees collected for harley exported, after allowing for adminintration costs and the estimated cost of making payment. The payment covers deliveries made between Aug. 1, 1944 and July 31, 1945.
