The Mid-West Association brief said the present taxin in mining shares "has undoubtedly provided a great deal of money for mine exploration but it is not a healthy condition and must lead to a slump and setlous losses." The "large sums" needed for development and equipment would be provided only if there was reasonable prospect of capital return plus a profit. The Quebec brief suggested a fourpoint plan for relief. It urged that taxes paid by mining companies to provincial governments and municipalities be allowed as a deduction from carnings before assessment for Dommion tax purposes; that the Dominion bullion handling charge of 35 cents an ounce be reduced to actual marketing cost to the government; that the subject of depletion be given careful study with a view to adjustment in tax rates, and that during the first five years of tax-paying life, mining companies be allowed to deduct from earnings, before taxes, depreciation up to a maximum of 25 per cent. in any one year.

The Mul-West brief called for reduction of taxes which enter into production costs, especially the sales tax; removal of the excess profits tax on corporation earnings; reduction of corporation income tax; removal of double taxation on corporation earnin criticising the acts of others. #### CORROSION-PROOF STEEL PLATE

LONDON ENG. Chemical and food manufacturing industries have hitherto encountered difficulties entailed by the fact that steel containers are liable to erusion. Nickel has often been substituted for steel, but this was only possible in cases where the value of the article justified the use of such expensive material. The British industry has now succeeded in finding a practical and economical solution to the problem. The steel plate is "clad" with a layer of pure solid nickel. Varying between 5 and 20', according to the aggregate thickness of the plate and the service for which it is required. The pure nickel is rolled on to the steel plate at a temperature high enough to ensure a permanent, true and sound bond. III.
