County Council Inspection Tour of Wood Lots

Nanawaga Scenery Revealed in a Party See Various Properties

Halton County Council held a special meeting Tuesday afternoon and toured the reforestation wood lots. Properties were the Cox acreage, which was bought in 1939 and planted in 1940, the Finney plot, the Frank plot, Guelph Junction plot and the Mahon property. All forestry projects are in Nanawaga Township. Five cars took members of the Council, A. Merritt, Department of Forests, H. Smith, County Engineer, Miss M. Maxted, County Treasurer, W. J. Robertson, Sheriff and members of the press from Oakville and Milton on a tour of the Township. The scenery and the state of the roads surprised nearly everyone as only one or two members had been in that section of the county. After the trip, Warden C. V. Hillmer stated that he had thought Halton county the most beautiful county in Ontario. After driving over Nanawaga roads, he was sure of it. Nanawaga is an Indian name meaning "Land of Springs". The Township has plenty of creeks fed by springs and could be a fisherman's paradise. Much bushland offers targets for the hunter's gun if you have the necessary permit.

33,000 trees have been planted this spring by the government on the five plots which range from 20 to 150 acres in size. Some were rather heavily wooded and needed only a cleaning up to make the property more valuable, some are of excellent second growth and one or two have cleared land, which has been planted. Two years ago the Government offered to take the planting and maintenance of the plots. At the end of thirty years the County has the privilege of selling the acreage to the Government, paying half the planting and maintenance cost and receiving half the proceeds from the lots or they could pay the Government all costs and take complete control of the forests. For the last two years the Government has planted the trees and the County has looked after them.
