TAX NOTICE--1946 MUNICIPALITY OF ACTON Second Instalment Now Due Attention is drawn to the payment of 1946 taxes, which are now payable in Four Instalments. Taxes are payable to the Municipal Treasurer at the Acton Public Utilities Office Instalments Are Due as Follows: SECOND INSTALMENT — JUNE 17th THIRD INSTALMENT — AUGUST 15th FOURTH INSTALMENT — OCTOBER 15th According to the Tax Collection By-law a penalty of Two per cent will be added on the amount remaining unpaid after the Fifteenth day of April until the Seventeenth Day of June, and an addition of Four per cent on the First Instalment remaining unpaid after the Seventeenth Day of June. This penalty applies to each instalment in a similar manner. The attention of Ratepayers is directed to the Penalties and Other clauses as printed on the reverse side of every Tax Notice and explained in detail on Every Tax Bill. Taxes are NOW due and payable.
