ROCKWOOD

The annual county convention of the W.C.T.U. was held in Norfolk St. Church, Guelph, June 11th. Delegates were present from Fergus, Rockwood and Mt. Forest. Mrs. R. Hudd, county president, opened the morning session with prayer. Mrs. Maddock was in charge of devotional exercises. Her comments were interesting and inspiring. Reports were given by the County secretaries and treasurers, also reports from the superintendents of the different departments. Mrs. Major Woolcott, speaking on her work in jails, reported giving testimonials to the inmates and on their release had placed a number of them in jobs. Speaking to one young girl inmate of the evils of the beverage rooms, the girl angrily replied "Why don't you shut up, there would be more work done in the home." Mrs. Woolcott spends all day every Sunday at the reformatory where she talks with inmates and presents hundreds of tracts to the inmates. She said the Christian Business Men had helped wonderfully in this work. It was stressed by members at the convention that a great hindrance to the temperance work is being caused by the indifference of the churches. An example of the curse of drink among our young people was given by one of the delegates. She told of a case in her home town where a young girl lay dead drunk in the fifth of a church shed. A young man drew it to the attention of her husband and he had her removed to her home in his car. When spoken to the next day, she had no remembrance of her condition and begged it should not be told. The news had already reached her employer and he decided there was no place in his factory for a young girl with such a reputation.

Dr. and Mrs. Kenny were guests at the dinner hour and Dr. Kenny presided at the table. He spoke of the work the society was doing and urged them to carry on. Mrs. Berry gave the address of welcome, the response was given by Mrs. O. Ostrander of Rockwood. At the afternoon session, Mrs. Pottam had charge of the devotional exercises. Her subject was "Wall of Prayer." She spoke of the influence of the mothers in the home, taking Hannah for an example of how she fulfilled her promise to God concerning her son Samuel. A fine solo by Mrs. Dillstone of Guelph was very much appreciated. Mrs. Worthylake of the S. A. Eventide Home gave the address. She said one of the strongest planks in the Salvation Army was abstinence. There could be no compromise, every member must be a total abstainer. It was on account of the terrible conditions caused by drink, the great leader, Gen. Booth had decided something must be done and at once and from his efforts came the Salvation Army. Major Worthylake had first become a member of the W.C.T.U. during the years she spent in Halifax and she was delighted to be stationed now in Guelph, her home town. She deplored the fact that government had let the barriers down and made it so easy for the boys and girls to get the drink habit. She too stressed the part the mothers must take in the home and how they must send the children from the home pure. She said all things were possible with God and urged the fight be sustained and need for constant prayer.
