ST. MARY'S EDITOR PASSED SUDDENLY AT SUMMER HOME

Lorne A. Eedy, 64, publisher of the St. Mary's Journal Argus, died suddenly early Monday at his summer home in Tobernony, following a brief illness. Born in Elliffield, west of St. Mary's, he had spent more than 30 years in weekly newspaper work.

In 1915 he purchased the Walkerton Telescope and from then until he sold that business in 1925, was engaged in the operation of a live-country weekly in the capital of Bruce County.

He was a leading figure in the organization of the Canadian Weekly Association, of which he had been an auditor since 1909 and he was named a director of the Canadian Press Association in 1912.

In 1924 Mr. Eedy was president of the C.W.N.A. when several hundred members of that association toured Europe and were received by the kings of Britain and Belgium and the president of France.

Mr. Eedy, like his father before him was an active worker in the Methodist, now the United Church of Canada. He was, in turn, Bible class teacher, superintendent of Sunday School, members of the board of stewards and more recently a director of the United Church Publishing House in Toronto. He was chairman of the committee which set up the weekly United Church Observer.

Mr. Eedy is survived by his wife, the former Grace Wilson; one son, John W. Eedy, at present on the staff of the Journal Argus; two daughters, Elizabeth (Mrs. James E. Brown) of Brantford and Miss Alice of Vancouver, B. C.; also one sister Irene (Mrs. Arch. Gillies) of Timmins, Ont.

FIRST ALL EXPRESS TRANS-ATLANTIC FLIGHT Hurovay was made in Canadian commercial aviation recently by one of Trans-Canada Air Lines' big, four-engine, Lancastrians when it took off from Montreal airport on a special trans-Atlantic flight to Prestwick, Scotland, carrying an all express load, no passengers being aboard the plane. It was the first flight of its kind and was arranged to take care of the large number of shipments that had been flown to Montreal from as far east as Halifax and as far west as Vancouver by T.C.A.'s domestic service. Space for these shipments was not available on the regular trans-Atlantic flights notwithstanding a recent increase in schedules from three to four flights weekly. Over 6,000 pounds of Canadian manufactured products made up the cargo, part of which is shown above being loaded into the aircraft from an express truck at the airport while the cargo agent and customs officer check each package. The shipments were distributed from Prestwick to various points in the United Kingdom, France, Belgium, Holland, Finland and India. On the right, with the aircraft in the background, is the four-man crew which made the flight, from left to right the members being Radio Officer W. Tritter, Navigation Officer Pat Roy, First Officer Henry Tilson and Captain Roger Smith, pilot.
