BURLINGTON

Ontario housewives can look forward to plenty of fruit this year, including apples for winter pie, according to Agricultural Department officials following a meeting of the Ontario Fruit and Vegetable Statistical Committee recently.

The council signed the agreement with the town of Burlington for fire protection at a cost of \$1,500.00 per year, an increase of \$750.00 over the agreement recently cancelled by the town of Burlington. The members of the council felt the agreement was a considerable increase, in view of the fact that the town had made an agreement with township East Flamboro at a rate of \$500.00 per year and \$50 for each call. The area covers the Old Survey of Nelson Township only.

At the regular monthly meeting of the high school board held on Tuesday evening, the transportation of all rural pupils to the local school from Nelson Township received the consideration of the Board. When the new high school district comes into effect in January, this is one of the obligations of the Board and in view of this fact it was felt that it was only fair to have the transportation start at the beginning of the school term.
