23 Acton Women Complete Red Cross Nursing Course

Mrs. D. F. Dewar, district leader for central Ontario, presented membership cards and pins to the 23 women who have completed their training in the Acton Red Cross nursing class, last Thursday evening. In a brief address, Mrs. Dewar congratulated the teachers and students and reminded them that what they had learned would be of great value to them and their community. She also commended the Branch on this new department, "a department ready to carry on in peacetime and whose members have qualified to be of service wherever needed". Some will serve in their own homes better qualified with a working knowledge of personal health and home hygiene. Some will give voluntary service in hospitals, in aiding the Public Health Nurse. Some will be of service to aged folks and shut-ins and in clinics.

Mrs. Dewar stated that Canada is health conscious as never before and urged the Reserve members to maintain that consciousness by giving volunteer service wherever needed. She praised the Centre provided by the local Red Cross Branch and spoke of its value as a loan centre, a place where supplies could be secured for illness in the home. Anything from a hospital bed with special frame to a wheel chair. It was urged that the Acton Red Cross Branch carry on. A marvellous contribution had been made during the years of war and the support of the Branch was needed for the various peacetime programs: aid to veterans, disaster relief, water safety, nutrition, Junior Red Cross Outpost Hospital, pools of sickroom equipment. The Canadian people look to the Red Cross for leadership in a world that needs peace and happiness.

Mr. Middleton, secretary of the Branch was chairman and expressed appreciation for the work of the staff and thanked the nurses who had given of their time and knowledge. He spoke of the excellent record of the Branch and welcomed the new members. Mrs. G. W. Benton, local officer in charge, presented the class their pins and cards. She thanked all for their co-operation and stated that the attendance had been excellent, well over 75 per cent. Mrs. Cullen and Miss Gibbons, unit leaders, also spoke of the interest of all the members and the value of the course. Dr. Buchanan, Dr. Garrett and Miss Chant, school nurse, gave lectures to the class.

Mrs. Richardson, on behalf of the class, presented each of the leaders with a corsage of roses and a gift in appreciation of their services. Miss M. I. Foy, formerly associate director of the department of home nursing, first aid and the reserve and organizer for blood clinics for Ontario division gave a very interesting address.

CRIP ASSOCIATION TRY EXPERIMENT WITH WEED KILLER

The Halton Crop Improvement Association recently added another project to their already long list of activities. This consists of an experiment with five different types of the new 2-4 D weed killers. This has been laid down on the roadside in front of the W. A. Marshall farm, Lot 1, 3rd line, of Esqueving. As a result of this experiment it is hoped to determine the effect of this new chemical on such perennial weeds as chicory, wild carrot, etc., and also to determine the type of 2-4 D most effective and economical.

The Association is also conducting a field meeting on Friday evening, July 19th on the farm of Geo. Currie, Lot 6, seventh line of Esqueving Township. A replicated test with 18 different varieties of oats and barley was laid down last spring on the Currie farm and Prof. Jas. Laughland of the Dept. of Field Husbandry, O. A. C., Guelph is scheduled to be on hand in the discussion.

The Halton Association is to be congratulated on the excellent and comprehensive program they are sponsoring. It includes in addition to those mentioned, a competition with long term pastures; tests with hybrid corn for both silage and husking purposes; tests on both hay and pasture with Nutrapilla, a new nitrogen fertilizer; annual pasture crops; hay and pasture tests including such grasses and legumes as Reed's Canary grass, Ladino, Broms, etc. A. T. Woodley of Nelson Township is president of this active farm organization.

Two Areas for School Formed in Erin Township

Grant of \$300 Made to Federation of Agriculture—Other Items of Recent Sessions

Erin Township Council met at Hillsburg on June 28th. All members were present, Reeve A. J. Swackhamer presiding.

Council in committee as a Court of Revision resumed its per adjournment of June 3rd and made the following changes in the assessment roll of 1946: Mrs. Jane Gray, Lot 28W, Con. 7, reduced \$600.00 on buildings; Fred Gray, Lot 7W, Con. 7, Geo. Alpine, Lot 7E, Con. 1, and Edward Lane, Hillsburg, had dogs struck from roll; Bert Awrey, Hillsburg had dog entered on roll.

The Court of Revision, having completed its work read and reported the Assessment Roll as revised now stand for the year 1946.

Hurt and Wheeler moved that a by-law be prepared to include S. S. Nos. 5, 1, 7, 8, 10, 13 and 16 in a Township School Area and to dissolve the school sections concerned. That the by-law be given a first and second reading and left for further consideration on Saturday, June 29th at 8 o'clock p.m. Standard Time and that the secretaries of S. S. Nos. 7 and 8 be notified by the clerk of this action in order that the trustees may present the wishes of the sections with reference to the matter. Carried.

A by-law was introduced and given the necessary readings for the purpose of dealing with subsection 1, 1916 of section 240, D.S.O. 1946 of the Municipal Act of Ontario authorizing that township cheques be signed by the treasurer only. Said by-law to come into effect, on and after July 2nd, 1946.

Erin Township unit of the Federation of Agriculture was granted the sum of \$300.00 to enable it to carry on the work of the Federation. Accounts passed and ordered paid were as follows: general accounts, \$168.98; relief accounts, \$20.65; road accounts, \$23.25.

Council adjourned to meet again at Hillsburg on Wednesday, August 7th, 1946 at 10 o'clock a.m.

Pursuant to a resolution passed at meeting of Council held on June 28, re the formation of a School Area, a special meeting was called for Saturday, June 29th of the ratepayers when the question was fully considered. Nine sections out of fifteen in the Township signified their intentions of joining a school area providing it was divided into two areas, one in the south and the other in the north.

The council after due consideration put all the schools in the Township into two areas to be divided as follows:

Area No. 1 S. S. Nos. 1, 4, 5, 7, 8, 10, 13 and 16.

Area No. 2 S. S. Nos. 3, 6, 9, 11, 12, 14 and Union Section No. 2 (Orton) East Garafraxa and Erin.

A by-law was passed requesting the Department of Education to approve of the same.

THESE DEVICES SAVE FARM LABOR

Among the farm labor saving devices assembled or invented by the Engineering Section, Field Husbandry Division, Dominion Experimental Farm Service, are many items of auxiliary utility, quite apart from the plans and specifications for heavier farm machinery. For example, full information with detailed plans and specifications may be obtained for making necessary articles for poultry. For example, a range water unit, self-watered feed trough, water fount, mash feeder, feed mixer, range shelter and a roost and pit.

For sheep there are single and double feeders and for hogs there are a hog breeding crate, loading chute, feeding troughs for all sizes of pigs, self-feeder, pig creep, weighing crate, green feed rack, alfalfa feed rack, hog feeding platform and harrowing pen. Among miscellaneous articles are a harrow dumping device, a breeding stall and bull pen for cattle, feed alley cart, horse made anvils.
