Fine Water Supply

"The laying of the water mains al ong Scene Street, the last action of the town to be served by a municipal supply, has been completed and on Tuesday the water was turned into the mains and is supplying those houses which have completed connections with the town system.

This section was part of the contract let last year to the Knowles Construction Co. In a section on Main Street and along the entire distance of Scene Street a solid rock foundation was encountered which made the digging slow. The Scene Street section was not finished last fall although material was put on the ground for the construction. Most of the rock had to be drilled and blasted but at last it has been completed and now all sections of Acton within the Corporation, limits have access to the fine municipal supply and adequate protection in case of fire.
