The new truck recently purchased by the town is a credit to the council, especially for garbage collection. The garbage is placed on the back of the truck, then dumped by power into the truck, which closes automatically when the material is dumped into the enclosed body, and presents a very neat appearance when closed.

The exceptionally dry spell has made a big run on the town water system almost every day in July. This was revealed from figures presented at a meeting of the Public Utilities Commission, water department, held on Tuesday evening. The pumpage mark every day in July, with the high point being reached last Saturday when 1,165,700 gallons of water were pumped, and along with 140,000 gallons taken out of reserve in the reservoir, made a total usage for the day of 1,306,000 gallons.

The town council have just completed the issuing of a splendid booklet on the Town of Burlington, setting forth the many advantages of the town, both residentially and industrially. The booklet is a sixteen page affair, and the first page gives an ideal view of the town from the air. The early history of the town is briefly reviewed on the next page, while page four heads with a map showing the strategic location of the town geographically in relation to the importance of industry, offering as it does the widest possible market and the most convenient source of labor and materials. — Gazette.

## MORE DAIRY HERDS NEEDED IN EUROPE

Cattle herds have been preserved in most European countries and emphasis is now being placed on the importance of providing enough milk to mothers, children and other classes of population regardless of their financial position. It thus appears, states Agriculture Abroad, issued by the Economics Division, Dominion Department of Agriculture, that the main effort will continue to be centred upon increasing the dairy herds.

With the present feed grain shortage which is likely to continue for at least some years to come, it is probable that beef cattle and hog output will not come back to normal as fast as milk production. It may take several years before the pig herd is replenished in Europe.

Egg production may recover more quickly in Europe. With the exception of a few western European countries, poultry is sidelined on general farms and largely subsists on offals. In countries now under occupation, the process of restoration is not likely to get under way until the return of more stable conditions.

It is estimated that continental Europe, excluding the Soviet Union, will have produced in 1945-46 about 52 to 57 per cent. of its average annual meat, cheese and egg requirements, and about 53 per cent. of its whole-milk needs for fluid consumption.
