Week of July 27 To August 5th for Industrial Holidays

Many Acton industries whose processing permits them to close their plants for a week's holiday period have chosen the period from July 27th to August 5th inclusive. The Baxter Laboratories close for two weeks from July 12th to Monday, July 29th.
Armco Ltd. closes August 2nd and reopens August 11th.
Acton Flour Mills observed the week of July 1st to July 5th for a holiday period.
Other industries are owing to the nature of their products, unable to close for a holiday period but staff and production are altered so that all secure a holiday.

OVERCROWDING CHICKS

Overcrowding chicks is the most common and most costly error in the poultry business. Overcrowding wastes feed, stunts growth, causes wet droppings, but not wet feet, but through weakened stock. Young chicks soon outgrow their original tender houses and trouble occurs if room for expansion is not provided.
Flash colony house should be supplemented with at least two range shelters to ensure adequate growth.
Some breeders and hatcherymen arrange to supply knock-down range shelters to baby chick customers at nominal cost. Other poultry service organizations, suggest the authorities, might usefully arrange to enter this field as well. Some woodworking firms in every poultry community could be approached to offer a line of knock-down range shelters.

Knowing How to Swim as Important As Walking

Knowing how to swim is as important as knowing how to walk, particularly if you enjoy the sunny pleasures and the good healthy exercise provided by swimming, fishing or just pleasure boating. Everyone can walk and we learn at an early age. It's important, too, since we depend so much on our ability to walk for our daily existence, yet when the summer rolls around, a good many of us will be spending a lot of time at the beach or the swimming pool or the cottage where there is plenty of water to swim in. It's true that the importance of water safety and knowing how to swim are very often forgotten and as a result, water fatalities are increasing.
Swimming takes on the importance of walking when you go to your daily newspaper and read about the many and varied water accidents that take place during the summer months.
Every boy and girl who goes to the water, and every boy and girl who is going to the water sometime during the summer months either at the beach or up at the summer cottage, if they can't swim, they are not going to have much fun. While others are out at the dining table swimming around and having lots of fun, they will have to content themselves by staying in the shallow water. If they can swim and are familiar with some of the rules of water safety, they could be one of the gang and be out there enjoying the activities.
The greatest danger on any beach is the individual himself. People often run risks by swimming in water that is contaminated, but by far the greatest risk is taken by those who don't know how to swim or handle themselves in case of emergency.
There's a danger to non-swimmers who walk out into unfamiliar waters, which may contain hidden holes and it's dangerous for a poor swimmer to venture too far into deep water without any knowledge of what to do in case of cramps or other dangers.
Carelessness and inability to swim are the two outstanding causes of small boat accidents. Studies of such accidents show that from 20 to 30 per cent of the victims were unable to swim. Rowing and canoeing is a highly enjoyable and healthful form of recreation. It need not be dangerous if reasonable care is taken. Most accidents can be prevented if a few simple rules are observed:
1. Don't swim alone.
2. Don't swim beyond your depth with artificial support such as a board, water wings, inner tubes, or on the shoulders of a well meaning but foolish swimming companion.
3. Don't swim for long distances unless accompanied by a boat.
4. Don't dive into water you are not familiar with. There may be all tree stumps and hidden rocks.
