Recently an accident occurred in our town, the rider being knocked from his bicycle, narrowly escaping serious injury and possibly death, while the machine was damaged beyond repair. To avoid incidents of this kind be warned now and provide the necessary lights.

Avoid also the penalty provided for failure so to do, which penalty is laid down in the said Highway Traffic Act, Section 10, Sub-section (9).

All riders are expected to play their part in this regard and above all parents should not permit their children to ride at night without lights. It is to say the least unwise and unsafe.
