President Fred Dawkins presided as chairman and gave a review of happenings during the current year. He stated that the Association had enjoyed a successful year, not only financially but actively.

The primary aim of the organization is to foster and develop sports in Acton for Actonians and that they had succeeded in placing a full scale program, dedicated to this ideal in the laps of the citizenry was his fondest realization.

The question of a Junior and Juvenile entry in the O.H.A. was brought out and it was decided to put more emphasis on the former entry in the coming season. The Association wishes to encourage the younger groups with better conditions and intends to develop the future Intermediates with all their available time. 3 Criminal Cases 13 Civil Cases At Fall Assizes

Nine Divorce Actions Heard and Granted—Court Continues This Week

Three criminal cases and 13 civil cases were on the docket at Sittings of the Supreme Court Fall Assizes which began at the Court House, Monday afternoon with Mr. Justice R. W. Treleaven presiding.

Claude W. Ezeard, is charged with rape of a young girl and Cecil L. Peters with attempted rape of a Port Credit woman. Henry Osmachenko, is charged with manslaughter arising from a motor accident on the Queen Elizabeth highway, three miles east of Freeman, in which Alex Kiegerman 23 was fatally injured.

After consideration of evidence the Grand Jury brought in a true bill against the accused in each of the three criminal cases. Of the 13 civil cases one is a damage action arising from a truck and bicycle collision October 17, 1944. Ira J. Johnston, Oakville, is seeking \$10,000 damages and \$1,376 out of pocket expenses from C. A. Warde, Ltd., the owners of the truck.

Remembrance Day MONDAY, NOVEMBER 11th

Monday, November 11th, being designated by the Parliament of Canada, as Remembrance Day, Acton Branch No. 197 Canadian Legion, British Empire Service League, in conjunction with the Reeves and Councils of the Village of Acton, and the Township of Nassagaweya, and the local clergy, will hold Memorial Services for those who gave their lives in service to King and Country, on Remembrance Day, as follows:

Acton, all patriotic societies and ex-servicemen, together with the Reeve and Council, will assemble at the Legion Hall at 10.30 a.m. and parade to Soldier's Memorial, led by Acton Boys' Band under the leadership of Mr. Chas. Mason, where a short service will be held, and the placing of wreaths at 10.50 a.m., followed by two minutes silence, in memory of those who paid the supreme sacrifice.

A memorial service will follow in the United Church, conducted by the clergy, the address will be given by Rev. Crawford Smith, B.D., M.C. of Guelph.

Nassagaweya, cars will leave Acton Legion Hall at 1.45 p.m. to convey Legionnaires to the Soldiers' Monument at Brookville, where at 2.15 p.m. the unveiling of the stones to those who gave their lives in the Second Great War, will take place. Following, a memorial service will be held in Nassagaweya Presbyterian Church, conducted by the local clergy.

The assembly will then proceed to the Township Hall at Brookville, where an honor roll containing the names of the men of the township who paid the supreme sacrifice will be unveiled.

As in former years, hot drinks and lunch will be served by the wives and daughters of our Nassagaweya Comrades at the Township Hall following the services.
