

Following, a memorial service will be held in Nassagaweya Presbyterian Church, conducted by the local clergy.

The assembly will then proceed to the Township Hall at Brookville, where an honor roll containing the names of the men of the township who paid the supreme sacrifice will be unveiled.

As in former years, hot drinks and lunch will be served by the wives and daughters of our Nassagaweya Comrades at the Township Hall following the services.
