Milton Manufacturers Purchases Prince George Hotel

There is local interest in the announcement this week of the purchase of the historic Prince George Hotel in Toronto to the Model Hotel Co.

Announcement of the purchase was made by Samuel Smith, owner of the Model Knitting Mills and a member of the newly formed Model Hotel Co. B. R. Shuker, a former captain in the Canadian Dental Corps is president of the company. Samuel Smith is treasurer. His three sons, Percy as secretary, Benjamin and Harry as vice-presidents, complete the Board.

The hotel which will retain its present name, will undergo extensive remodeling "as soon as materials become available." The remodeling is expected to begin in 1947. The new owners state that if the law permits, a cocktail bar will be included. Details of the remodeling and an estimate of their cost have not yet been determined.

No other hotels as yet have been bought by the new company nor any other purchases contemplated at the present time. The new owners also stated that the present staff will be retained.

Remodelling of the hotel will involve changes in the lobby and some of the larger rooms will be converted into two rooms to increase the present 184 rooms to slightly over 200 rooms.

Last Fall Trip For River Boats

Supply Ships For Fishermen End Red River Run

WINNIPEG (CP) — Nine familiar river boats—from the 81 foot 67-ton motorship Luana III to the smaller 45 foot M. S. Miner—have plied their way north along the Red River from Winnipeg to Lake Winnipeg for the last time before spring.

They are the vessels which all summer brought supplies to the Lake Winnipeg fishermen whose provinces with net and hook placed Manitoba at the top of all Canadian provinces in the production of fresh water fish, and which returned from their northern voyages with holds loaded with whitefish, pickerel, tullibee, pike, lake trout, perch, mullets and jackfish.

The final trip for the motorships marked the close of the government-regulated fall fishing season. By the time the fishermen are ready to open their winter season, ice will have formed on the upper-lake.

In drydock at Selkirk, Gimli and Necla the 150 Diesel engine boats which make up the fish fleet on Lake Winnipeg, will spend the winter while the fishermen prepare for their winter months' work of fishing through ice holes.

The major portion of the \$3,333,000 annual fish catch in the province is exported to the United States, although Canadian markets also get their share.

The industry is a major one as shown by the 6,000 people who make their living as fishermen, together with the many others employed in the transportation system and allied industries.

The grand-daddy of the supply fleet is Capt. Joe Sigurdur of the 70 foot 51-ton W. S. Newton, who admits he'll never see 70 again. He came to Gimli with the second Icelandic immigration when only four years old and has spent the rest of his life on Lake Winnipeg and its shoreline.

AGED CHIEFTAINNESS HAILS NEW CLANSMAN

SYDNEY, N.S. (CP)—To a MacLeod, he be a MacLeod from Scotland's Skye, Harris or Lewis, or from anywhere else in the world, a letter from Flora, 28th chief of the clan and Lady of Dunvegan, traditional home of the MacLeods, is a priceless thing.

Such a letter has been received by four-month-old Roderick Alden MacLeod of Sydney. The letter signed by the 73-year-old chieftainess at Dunvegan Castle said:

"I am so glad there is another young MacLeod to carry on our great clan and its proud traditions. Some day they (his parents) must bring you to Dunvegan and you will feel that your long-ago deep roots belong here."

Flora MacLeod is a direct descendant of Viking Olaf the Black, one of whose sons founded the clan in the 13th Century. She still keeps the original home of the clan at Dunvegan Castle in the Isle of Skye. The letter to the young clansman in Sydney was prompted when the boy's father, F.O. Alden MacLeod, paid a visit to Dunvegan Castle while serving with the R.C.A.F.
