SWITCHES WAR PLANT TO WAR MANUFACTURE

VANCOUVER (CP)—A punch and a pair of shears set Arthur Hingley up in an \$80,000 children's wagon business.

Mr. Hingley's Steel Fabricators Ltd. during the war turned out casings for machine gun nests and water-tight compartments for Victory ships. It now turns out monthly 4,000 children's wagons.

"Formed five years ago with a punch and a pair of shears," Mr. Hingley said, "the firm now has two plants and a machine shop where company engineers make their own dies."

In addition to output of wagons, the plant has produced 5,000 scooters and a like number of other wheeled toys.

Heavy Fine For Violations of Prices Board Regulations

Two Acton Youths Sentenced To Jail Terms for Robbing Edward Bride

Convicted on four charges of violating Wartime Prices and Trade Board regulations, H. G. Wilson, local butcher, was fined a total of \$275 by Magistrate Kenneth M. Langdon, in County Magistrate's Court in Milton last week.

For failing to keep proper books and records, Mr. Wilson was fined \$500 and costs of six months. On the charge of slaughtering hogs in excess of his quota, he was assessed \$100 and costs or thirty days; for failure to file proper returns and reports with the W.P.T.B. \$20 or 30 days and for failing to collect meat coupons, \$25 or 15 days. Mr. Wilson pleaded not guilty to each charge as it was read.

Hiram D. Hall, W.P.T.B. investigator and auditor, said he was asked by the McNish Commission, last spring to make an investigation into Mr. Wilson's books.

Although Mr. Wilson did not testify on his own behalf, his counsel E. J. Murphy, made a strong plea for an acquittal. He argued that Wilson was doing custom slaughtering which would account for the additional number of sides found by the investigator.
