All bulk purchases of Chistmas Turkeys by industrial concerns or service clubs for distribution among employeve or other persons must not exceed the wholesale ceiling prices according to a recent announcement of the Wartime Prices and Trade Board

In many cases industrial companies have been willing to pay the retail price demanded by some supplies in order to obtain a sufficient supply of Christmas turkeys.

The practice of supply bulk purchasers with turkeys at higher than certing prices has in past years treulted in a arrious shortage in retail stores where the retailer cannot, by law, may more than the wholesale


