BURLINGTON

Of the more than 400 High School students given the tuberculosis test by Dr. R. T. Dingle, M.O.H., assisted by Mrs. B. Gordon, P.H.N., there were 17 positive reactions. These students were taken to Hamilton for chest X-ray and follow-up by Dr. Dingle and the nurse.

At a meeting of the Public Library Board held on Monday evening, after careful consideration to the matter a committee was named to appear before town council at its first meeting in the new year, asking them to take over the public library and run it as a municipal library.

Burlington had some distinguished visitors on Thursday afternoon last when the provincial inspector of jails and the county sheriff visited what is supposed to be the local jail under the police office in the town hall. The conditions he found here he termed as amazing and added there was not a worse jail in the province of Ontario. He deplored the unsanitary conditions and gave the town "just so long to clean up or else." In addition he insisted there must be a steady caretaker.—Gazette.

MILTON

The annual meeting of the Canadian Club was held at the Milton Inn, last Thursday evening, when Mr. C. P. Seeley, of Burlington spoke on the subject of the "Conception of Citizenship." The topic had been suggested through a newspaper item, concerning an alderman, who had stated that he was not sure that he was a Canadian. In outlining the subject, Mr. Seeley suggested that Citizenship should be considered, essentially, with the realization that we are "united Britishers, with undivided Sovereign authority and also from the viewpoint that true citizenship protects the rights of the individual.

At a meeting of Milton Council a motion was passed hiring Mr. Hugh Warmington as night constable for the Town of Milton at a salary of \$1,400 per annum. Duties to commence January 1st, 1947.

Chief Canning brought up the matter of conduct at Saturday night dances. He stated there had been a number of convictions of persons at these dances and the rowdiness has not been curbed. Chief Canning suggested the closing of the Saturday night dances. This matter was left for the new council to deal with.

The four visiting culturists go to the homes of customers armed with a little black bag crammed with various shades and types of creams, lotions, powders and lipsticks.

The Edmonton firm offering the service said its culturists are trained beauticians who choose the right blends of powder and rouge to match individual complexions and records are kept of various types so a girl may order the correct make-up at any time.
