Car Stolen From Garage in Erin With Some Money

Capture of a Toronto man a few hours after an automobile had been stolen from Carney's Garage at Erin may be a step toward solution of the series of break-ins in that vicinity, police believe.

Stanley McDonald, Toronto, was arrested by Toronto police after provincial police had telephoned the license number of the stolen car.

The Erin garage, officers found, had been entered through a back window. Some \$25 in silver had been stolen from the office safe, and an automobile left overnight in the building was taken. Tools and other valuable articles were not touched, so it is assumed that the vehicle was the primary object.

Garage break-ins have plagued city, county and provincial police, in this vicinity for several years. On some occasions tools and equipment, including such heavy articles as acetylene torch outfits with tanks, have been stolen. Other times, money and cars seem to have been the objective.

FORMER MANAGER HERE RETIRES FROM SERVICE OF BANK

From the Tilbury News we learn of the retirement from the Bank of Montreal of Mr. F. A. McLean, manager of the branch in that town and many of our readers will be interested in this item which appeared in a recent issue of the Tilbury paper.

"Frederick A. MacLean, popular bank of Montreal manager here since 1935, has announced his retirement on pension at the end of this month. Succeeding Mr. MacLean is Albert C. Walk, for the past three years in charge of the bank's branch at Fenton Falls.

"Mr. MacLean has served as a bank manager for 34 of the 42 years in the banking profession. Born at Petrolia, he joined the bank in 1904 here, at Tilbury. This is the same branch from which, 42 years after, he is retiring as manager. In the years between his early period of training at Tilbury and his return as manager in 1935, Mr. MacLean successively held the management of the bank's offices at Acton, Watford, Chesley and Weston.

"For the present, Mr. and Mrs. MacLean intend to remain in Tilbury. Mr. MacLean has held office as treasurer of the Lions Club for the past 9 years, and has been active with the hockey and lawn bowling clubs. In the well earned years of leisure that lie ahead, Mr. MacLean looks forward to indulging his liking for fishing and other hobbies."

meetings during the year on the first and third Mondays of each month at 7:30 p.m., except during July and August when meetings would be at the call of the Reeve.

Members of the Acton, Georgetown and Milton Public Health Nurse Committee named by Council were Dr. E. W. F. H. Crighton and the Reeve and a member to be appointed by the Acton School Board.

The Clerk reported vital statistics for the year. There were 34 births, 27 marriages, and 12 deaths during 1946 recorded in Acton.

The Fire Brigade requested Council to purchase a new thirty-foot aluminum extension ladder to replace the wooden one recently broken. The cost was \$149.50 and the ladder was indestructible. The Brigade would not require the usual purchase of hose this year. Council approved of this equipment, but quotations were to be received from other firms.

The Clerk was instructed to return the checks tendered on sewage disposal construction, submitted by the contractors. Council declined to accept tenders submitted as it was considered the prices were too high.

The Clerk reported that Mr. Horose of the Wartime Housing had been in town and was prepared to return to Acton the week of the 20th if Acton was ready to enter negotiations. The question was discussed but action was deferred until a later meeting.
