Milton Juniors Win by 7-3 from Acton Juniors Monday

Grenke Was Top Scorer with 4 Counters to His Credit

Milton Juniors Monday night broke their losing streak when they defeated Acton by a score of 7-3 in an O.H.A. tilt in Milton. "Cowboy" Murray Grenke and Stan Fay threw grief into the visitors' tepee when they scored 6 goals between them.

When the old battle started, it looked as though Acton were going to dominate the night's fun, as Masters took a pass from Townsley at the 35 second mark to beat Rusk. However, play was even until Grenke grabbed a loose puck at his own blue line to weave his way through the whole Acton team and beat Robson easily. The tying counter seemed to put some pep in the local hearts and they went in there like the thunder-bolt. Thirty-five seconds later Stan Fay grabbed a shot from Grenke to put them up one.

There was no further scoring until Stan Fay and Grenke grabbed the disc in their own back yard to weave their way through to beat the Acton goalie at 15:20. Exactly two minutes later Grenke was uncovered at the visitor's blue line where he nabbed a wandering puck. He spun and rushed in to notch Milton's fourth in the frame. Time after time the Acton youngsters went in there with four man attacks. Their passing was good, but the Milton back checking broke up play after play. Only two penalties were handed out, one to each team for holding.

Acton Simon Pures opened the second with four and five man attacks but the Milton lads back checked like hornets with no plays being organized. Midway in the second Acton's plays began to click which baffled the local lads. It payed off for them at the 16:45 mark, when Stewart beat Rusk, to add another to Acton's tally. Masales was handed the only penalty during this edition for holding in a Milton attack.

At the opening of the third canto, Acton pressed hard. Allen drew a penalty for a trip when Townsley broke through. A minute later Charles Fay grabbed a loose puck to count Milton's fifth. Ron Brush and Service were each sent to the拘留房 for holding as the visitors pressed during the frame. Brush handed Stan Fay a pass in a scramble for the local's sixth at the 9:30 mark. Grenke at 14:37 grabbed a drizzler at Acton's blue line, edged in and with plenty of time let a sizzler fly at Robson. It landed in the upper right hand corner for the prettiest counter of the session. A half a minute later Stewart grabbed a grounder from Arbie to beat Rusk easily. There was no further scoring as Milton lads seemed to finish up stronger than their neighboring rivals.
